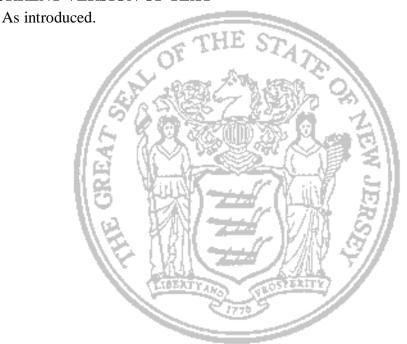

A municipality or a county with an Hispanic population of 10 10% or more, according to the latest federal decennial census, may 11 by resolution establish a municipal or county Hispanic advisory 12 commission, as appropriate, which shall advise the municipal and county governing bodies on matters concerning the needs of the 13 Hispanic community and the impact of local legislation on the 14 15 Hispanic community in the municipality or the county. 16 municipal or county Hispanic advisory commission so established 17 shall consist of at least five members, to be appointed by majority 18 vote of the governing body of the municipality or county.
