SYNOPSIS

Revises jurisdiction of Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission, and transfers administration of Historic New Bridge Landing State Park from DEP to Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission.

CURRENT VERSION OF TEXT

As amended by the General Assembly on December 15, 2008.

(Sponsorship Updated As Of: 2/6/2009)

1 AN ACT concerning Historic New Bridge Landing State Park, and amending and supplementing P.L.1995, c.260.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. Section 1 of P.L.1995, c.260 (C.13:15B-1) is amended to read as follows:
- 1. a. The Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission, a body corporate and politic with corporate succession, is created in the [Division of Parks and Forestry of the] Department of Environmental Protection. The commission is an instrumentality exercising public and essential governmental functions. Exercise by the commission of the powers conferred by this act is deemed to be an essential governmental function of the State.
 - b. The commission shall consist of [the following] nine members to be appointed and qualified as follows:
 - (1) [the Director of the Division of Parks and Forestry or the director's] the Commissioner of Environmental Protection or the commissioner's designee; and
 - (2) eight residents of the State, ²who shall be recommended by their respective governing body and ² appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, among whom shall be one representative each from the County of Bergen, the Blauvelt-Demarest Foundation, River Edge Borough, and New Milford Borough; and two representatives each from the Bergen County Historical Society and Teaneck Township.
- Each member in office on the effective date of P.L.,

 c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill) shall serve

 for the term of the appointment and until a successor shall have

 been appointed and qualified.

Each member appointed by the Governor shall serve for a term of five years ¹ and may be reappointed upon completion of the term.]; provided, however, that of the members first appointed, the representative from the County of Bergen shall serve a term of four years, one representative from Teaneck Township shall serve a term of three years and one shall serve a term of four years, one representative from the Bergen County Historical Society shall serve a term of four years and one shall serve a term of five years, the representative from the Blauvelt-Demarest Foundation shall serve a term of five years, and the representatives from River Edge Borough and New Milford Borough shall each serve an initial term

of three years. Each member appointed by the Governor may be reappointed upon completion of the term.

Each member shall serve for the term of the appointment and until a successor shall have been appointed and qualified. Any vacancy or reappointment shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment.

Members of the commission shall serve without compensation but may be reimbursed for necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. The members of the commission shall elect annually a chairman and vice-chairman from their number, and a secretary and treasurer who need not be members of the commission. The same person may be elected to serve both as secretary and treasurer. The chairman of the commission shall be its presiding officer and the vice-chairman shall serve as chairman in the absence of the chairman. The commission shall organize and adopt procedures for the conduct of its business. Five members of the commission shall constitute a quorum and the concurrence of five members of the commission shall be necessary to validate all acts of the commission.

- c. Any member of the commission may be removed by the Governor, for cause, after a public hearing.
- d. Each member of the commission, before entering upon the member's duties, shall take and subscribe an oath to perform the duties of the office faithfully, impartially, and justly to the best of the member's ability. A record of the oath shall be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State.
- e. The commission shall prepare, adopt, and implement a master plan for the physical development of the property under the commission's jurisdiction, hereby designated as the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park, or a portion thereof; review State and local actions that impact on the park to insure that these actions conform as nearly as possible to the commission's master plan; and coordinate and support activities by citizens' groups to promote and preserve the park.
- f. On or before December 31 in each year the commission shall make an annual report of its activities for the preceding calendar year to the Governor and, pursuant to section 2 of P.L.1991, c.164 (C.52:14-19.1), to the Legislature. The report shall set forth a complete operating and financial statement covering its operations during the year. The commission may, in addition, at any time request the Governor and the Legislature to appropriate funds for commission purposes.
- g. The commission shall cause an audit of its books and accounts to be made at least once in each year and the cost thereof shall be treated as one incurred by the commission in the administration of this act, and a copy thereof shall be filed with the State Treasurer, the State Comptroller, and the State Auditor.

- h. (1) No member, officer, employee, or agent of the commission shall be financially interested, either directly or indirectly, in any project or any part of a project area, ¹ [other than a residence,] ¹ or in any contract, sale, purchase, lease, or transfer of real or personal property to the Department of Environmental Protection for inclusion in the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park.
- 7 (2) Any contract or agreement knowingly made in contravention 8 of this section is voidable.
- 9 (3) Any person who shall willfully violate any of the provisions 10 of this section shall forfeit his office or employment and shall be 11 guilty of a crime of the fourth degree.

- 2. Section 2 of P.L.1995, c.260 (C.13:15B-2) is amended to read as follows:
- 2. a. The Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission shall coordinate and implement federal, State, county, municipal, and private development policies and other activities relating to the historic preservation and recreational use of the property under the commission's jurisdiction.

The Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, and, after a public hearing, or public hearings, adopt a master plan or portion thereof for the physical development of the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park, or amend the master plan. The master plan shall consist of a general management plan and an interpretive plan. The master plan may include proposals for various stages in the future development or preservation of the park. The master plan shall include a report presenting the objectives, assumptions, standards and principles which are embodied in the various interlocking portions of the master plan. The master plan shall be a composite of the one or more written proposals recommending the physical development and expansion of the park either in its entirety or a portion thereof which the commission shall prepare after meetings

Consultation, planning, and technical expertise shall be made available to local planning bodies that wish to implement land-use policy to enhance the park area. The commission shall act on or refer complaints by citizens' groups or private residents who discover hazardous situations, pollution, or evidence of noncompliance with use regulations.
- d. Upon completion, the commission shall submit the master plan or any amendment to the master plan to the Commissioner of Environmental Protection for review and approval.

The commissioner shall approve or disapprove the master plan or any amendment thereto within 90 days of receipt thereof. The commissioner may, for cause, disapprove the master plan or any amendment thereto. In the event that the commissioner fails to take action on the master plan or any amendment thereto within the 90-day period specified herein, then the master plan or amendment, as appropriate, shall be deemed to have been approved.

The Historic New Bridge Landing Commission shall administer the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park, including but not limited to the Steuben House. Any State funds appropriated to the Department of Environmental Protection or the Division of Parks and Forestry in the department specifically for, or related to the administration of, the Steuben House or Historic New Bridge Landing State Park shall be reallocated to the Historic New Bridge Landing Commission for the purposes of the administration of the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park.

c. In addition to any other powers pursuant to P.L.1995, c.260 (C.13:15B-1 et seq.), the commission shall review and approve all proposed changes, developments or improvements to publicly-owned lands, buildings, and structures within its jurisdiction to prevent or mitigate any adverse impact upon pre-historic or historic resources that have a significant potential to add to the knowledge and appreciation of the story of Historic New Bridge Landing and its vicinity or to enhance its preservation as a Revolutionary War site.

3. This act shall take effect immediately.

SPUNSOR'S STATEMENT

This bill specifies that the jurisdiction of the Historic New Bridge Landing Commission (commission) extends to all publicly-owned lands, buildings and structures: fronting the Hackensack River at the former village of New Bridge; fronting on Hackensack Avenue and fronting on Main Street, east of Hackensack Avenue and north of Coles Brook, in the Borough of River Edge; fronting on Old New Bridge Road, on Steuben Place in the Borough of New Milford; lying south of Riverview Avenue, east to River Road in Teaneck Township; fronting on the Hackensack River within a halfmile of New Bridge Landing and the 1889 iron swing bridge.

This bill also assigns to the commission administrative authority for Historic New Bridge Landing State Park, including but not limited to the Steuben House. The bill also provides that any State funds appropriated to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) or the Division of Parks and Forestry in the DEP specifically for, or related to the administration of, the Steuben House or Historic New Bridge Landing State Park be reallocated to the commission.

In addition, this bill provides that the commission shall review and approve all proposed changes, developments or improvements to publicly-owned lands, buildings, and structures within its jurisdiction to prevent or mitigate any adverse impact upon prehistoric or historic resources that have a significant potential to add

to the knowledge and appreciation of the story of Historic New

The nine member commission was created by P.L.1995, c.260 (C.13:15B-1 et seq.), within the DEP's Division of Parks and Forestry, to act as the coordinating entity for the various bodies and organizations that own and operate properties and structures in the historic community of New Bridge Landing in Bergen County, for the purpose of re-creating the area as a unified historic cultural educational park. Under current law, the commission may also contract for the preservation of the current buildings and lands as well as construct and operate a visitor center, library, mill site, curator's residence, parking area, and other appropriate structures. This bill would expand the commission's responsibilities to include the day-to-day administration of the State park.

The Historic New Bridge Landing Historical Site spans the Hackensack River at the intersection of four municipalities (River Edge Borough, New Milford Borough, Teaneck Township, and Hackensack City). The State, Bergen County, the Bergen County Historical Society, and Teaneck Township each own portions of the site. The site includes numerous structures of historical importance and interest to the general public, including the State-owned Steuben House, the Westervelt-Thomas Barn, the Demarest House and the Campbell-Christie House foundations. General Washington and his army found temporary refuge here while retreating from Fort Lee during a British offensive. The area is also noteworthy for its Jersey Dutch and Native American heritage.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably Senate No. 1644 (SCS), with committee amendments.

Senate Bill No. 1644 (SCS), as amended, revises the jurisdiction of the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission (commission), and transfers the administration of the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park to the commission.

Senate Bill No. 1644 (SCS), as amended, also clarifies the commission's jurisdiction by specifying publicly-owned lands, buildings and structures related to the historic site; re-designating these properties as the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park; requiring the commission to prepare and adopt a master plan for the physical development of the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park, subject to final approval by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) Commissioner; authorizing the commission to review and approve all proposed changes, developments or improvements to publicly-owned lands, buildings, and structures within its jurisdiction; and clarifying the structure and duties of the commission and its members.

The substitute bill reallocates any State funds appropriated to the (DEP) or the Division of Parks and Forestry in the DEP specifically for, or related to the administration of, the Steuben House or Historic New Bridge Landing State Park to the commission, following the commissioner's approval of the master plan adopted by the commission.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The committee amendments clarify that the first terms of the gubernatorial appointments first made to the commission with the advice and consent of the Senate will have staggered terms. The amendments also clarify the measure of the land under the jurisdiction of the commission.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The DEP has noted that it expends approximately \$20,000 annually from its Parks Management budget on utility and maintenance expenses for the Steuben House at Historic New Bridge Landing. Historically, the aforementioned allocation has not included staffing funds for this site. Under the committee substitute, these funds would be internally transferred to a new account controlled by the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission and used for the same purposes.

Based upon information obtained through the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission: The commission currently receives all of its funding from the DEP budget. Its secretary and commissioners are volunteers and do not receive any reimbursement for their time or services. The commission adopted a General Management Plan in 2000, with its core elements being updated in 2003 and 2006 through grants provided by the New Jersey Historic Trust and a private foundation. A foundation grant is currently funding a wetlands delineation and topographic survey of the site. It may be possible that these studies and documents fulfill the requirement under the committee substitute that the commission prepare a Master Plan for the physical development of the park.

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates that the committee substitute may not increase any immediate or short-term State costs but may require additional administrative funds in the long-term if there is additional physical development of the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park under the commission's jurisdiction.

The Senate Environment Committee reports favorably a Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 1644.

The Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 1644 revises the jurisdiction of the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission (commission), and transfers the administration of the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park to the commission.

The substitute bill specifies that the jurisdiction of the commission extends to all publicly-owned lands, buildings and structures: fronting the Hackensack River at the former village of New Bridge; fronting on Hackensack Avenue and fronting on Main Street, east of Hackensack Avenue and north of Coles Brook, in the Borough of River Edge; fronting on Old New Bridge Road, on Steuben Place in the Borough of New Milford; lying south of Riverview Avenue, east to River Road in Teaneck Township; and fronting on the Hackensack River within a half-mile of New Bridge Landing and the 1889 iron swing bridge.

The substitute bill assigns to the commission administrative authority for the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park, including but not limited to the Steuben House, and reallocates any State funds appropriated to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) or the Division of Parks and Forestry in the DEP specifically for, or related to the administration of, the Steuben House or Historic New Bridge Landing State Park to the commission, following the commissioner's approval of the master plan adopted by the commission under section 4 of the substitute bill.

The master plan for the physical development of the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park, which would be prepared and adopted by the commission after one or more public hearings, may include proposals for various stages in the future development or preservation of the park. The master plan shall consist of a general management plan and an interpretive plan. The master plan must include a report presenting the objectives, assumptions, standards and principles which are embodied in the various interlocking portions of the master plan. The master plan shall be a composite of the one or more written proposals recommending the physical development and expansion of the park either in its entirety or a portion thereof which the

commission shall prepare after meetings with the governing bodies of the affected municipalities and counties, and any agencies and instrumentalities thereof.

In preparing the master plan or any portion thereof or amendment thereto the commission must consider existing patterns of development and any relevant master plan or other plan of development, and shall insure widespread citizen involvement and participation in the planning process. The commission shall act in support of local suggestions or desires to complement the park master plan. Consultation, planning, and technical expertise would be made available to local planning bodies that wish to implement land-use policy to enhance the park area. The commission shall act on or refer complaints by citizens' groups or private residents who discover hazardous situations, pollution, or evidence of noncompliance with use regulations.

Upon completion, the commission must submit the master plan or any amendments to the master plan to the Commissioner of DEP for review and approval. The commissioner must approve or disapprove the master plan or any amendment thereto within 90 days of receipt thereof. The commissioner may, for cause, disapprove the master plan or any amendment thereto. In the event that the commissioner fails to take action on the master plan or any amendment thereto within the 90-day period, the master plan or amendment, as appropriate, would be deemed to have been approved

In addition, the substitute bill provides that the commission must review and approve all proposed changes, developments or improvements to publicly-owned lands, buildings, and structures within its jurisdiction to prevent or mitigate any adverse impact upon pre-historic or historic resources that have a significant potential to add to the knowledge and appreciation of the story of Historic New Bridge Landing and its vicinity or to enhance its preservation as a Revolutionary War site.

These amendments would:

- (1) clarify that each of the eight public members of the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, must be recommended by their respective governing body;
- (2) decrease the jurisdiction of the commission from within a quarter-mile to two-tenths of a mile of New Bridge Landing and the 1889 iron swing bridge; and
- (3) exclude Block 1002, Lot 2 in Teaneck Township from the jurisdiction of the commission.



- The committee substitute revises the jurisdiction of the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission by transferring the administration of its properties from the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to the commission. The commission was created in the DEP pursuant to P.L.1995, c.260.
- It re-designates the Historic New Bridge Landing site as the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park and requires the commission to prepare and adopt a master plan for its physical development.
- The commission's jurisdiction over specific publicly-owned lands, buildings and structures related to the historic site is clarified, as well as the structure and duties of the commission and its members.
- The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates that the committee substitute may not add any immediate or short-term costs to the State Budget but may require additional administrative funds in the long-term as the historic site becomes more developed.



BILL DESCRIPTION

Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 1644 of 2008 revises the jurisdiction of the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission by transferring the administration and funding of the properties under its jurisdiction from the DEP to the commission. The committee substitute also clarifies the commission's jurisdiction by specifying publicly-owned lands, buildings and structures related to the historic site; re-designating these properties as the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park; requiring the commission to prepare and adopt a master plan for the physical development of the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park, subject to final approval by the DEP Commissioner; authorizing the commission to review and approve all proposed changes, developments or improvements to publicly-owned lands, buildings, and structures within its jurisdiction; and clarifying the structure and duties of the commission and its members.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

OFFICE OF LEGISLATIVE SERVICES

Although the OLS did not receive fiscal note worksheet data from the Executive Branch on the committee substitute, the DEP and the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission did informally provide the OLS with relevant information, as follows: The DEP states that it expends approximately \$20,000 annually from its Parks Management budget on utility and maintenance expenses for the Steuben House at Historic New Bridge Landing. Historically, the aforementioned allocation has not included staffing funds for this site. Under the committee substitute, these funds would be internally transferred to a new account controlled by the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission and used for the same purposes.

An official of the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission offered the following information concerning the committee substitute: The commission currently receives all of its funding from the DEP budget. Its secretary and commissioners are volunteers and do not receive any reimbursement for their time or services. The commission adopted a General Management Plan in 2000, with its core elements being updated in 2003 and 2006 through grants provided by the New Jersey Historic Trust and a private foundation. A foundation grant is currently funding a wetlands delineation and topographic survey of the site. The commission official believes these studies and documents fulfill the requirement under the committee substitute that the commission prepare a Master Plan for the physical development of the park.

Considering the aforementioned information, the OLS estimates that the committee substitute may have a modest, but not immediate, fiscal impact on the State Budget. This is based on the assumption that the existing funding level for maintenance and utility expenses would not immediately change when transferred to the commission's jurisdiction, but could eventually increase as the park becomes more developed and draws more visitors. Consequently, as the park becomes more developed, staffing and security needs could also become more acute. Further, once the commission assumes administrative control of its budget, it may require the hiring of at least one paid staff person to serve as its administrator or manager. However, the

reassignment of a DEP employee could fulfill this need until additional funding is secured for this purpose.

With respect to the development of a Master Plan, normal costs associated with this activity may be avoided if the DEP approves the existing planning documents already prepared by the commission. Any further updating or supplementary data required by the DEP could incur added costs that would be supported by the DEP if alternative, non-State funding sources could not be found.

The Assembly Environment and Solid Waste Committee reports favorably an Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No.3036.

The Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 3036 revises the jurisdiction of the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission (commission), and transfers the administration of the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park from the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to the commission.

The substitute bill amends current law to revise the membership of the commission to provide that: the DEP Commissioner, or the commissioner's designee, serve on the commission rather than the Director of the DEP's Division of Parks and Forestry; and the eight public members of the commission be appointed by the Governor with the advise and consent of the Senate.

The substitute bill assigns to the commission administrative authority for the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park, including

The master plan for the physical development of the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park, which would be prepared and adopted by the commission after one or more public hearings, may include proposals for various stages in the future development or preservation of the park. As required by the substitute bill, the master plan shall consist of a general management plan and an interpretive plan. The master plan must include a report presenting the objectives, assumptions, standards and principles which are embodied in the various interlocking portions of the master plan. The master plan shall be a composite of the one or more written proposals recommending the physical development and expansion of the park either in its entirety or a portion thereof which the commission shall prepare after meetings with the governing bodies of the affected municipalities and counties, and any agencies and instrumentalities thereof.

In preparing the master plan or any portion thereof or amendment thereto the commission must consider existing patterns of development and any relevant master plan or other plan of development, and insure widespread citizen involvement and participation in the planning process. The commission shall act in support of local suggestions or desires to complement the park master plan. Consultation, planning, and technical expertise would be made available to local planning bodies that wish to implement land-use policy to enhance the park area. The commission shall act on or refer complaints by citizens' groups or private residents who discover hazardous situations, pollution, or evidence of noncompliance with use regulations.

Upon completion, the commission must submit the master plan or any amendments to the master plan to the DEP Commissioner for review and approval. The commissioner must approve or disapprove the master plan or any amendment thereto within 90 days of receipt thereof. The commissioner may, for cause, disapprove the master plan or any amendment thereto. In the event that the commissioner fails to take action on the master plan or any amendment thereto within the 90-day period, the master plan or amendment, as appropriate, would be deemed to have been approved.


