P.L. 1997, CHAPTER 267, approved December 22, 1997 Assembly No. 678

1 AN ACT concerning handicapped driver certification and amending P.L.1949, c.280.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. Section 1 of P.L.1949, c.280 (C.39:4-204) is amended to read as follows:
- 1. The term "handicapped person" as employed herein shall include any person who has lost the use of one or more limbs as a consequence of paralysis, amputation, or other permanent disability or who is permanently disabled as to be unable to ambulate without the aid of an assisting device or whose mobility is otherwise limited as certified by a physician with a plenary license to practice medicine and surgery or a podiatrist licensed to practice in this State or a bordering state or a physician stationed at a military or naval installation located in this State who is licensed to practice in any state.

- 2. Section 3 of P.L.1949, c.280 (C.39:4-206) is amended to read as follows:
- 3. The director shall issue to such applicant, also, a placard of such size and design as shall be determined by the director in consultation with the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services in the Department of Labor, indicating that a handicapped person identification card has been issued to the person designated therein, which shall be displayed in such manner as the director shall determine on the motor vehicle used to transport the handicapped person, when the vehicle is parked overtime or in special parking places established for use by handicapped persons.
- Notwithstanding any provision of this act to the contrary, the chief of police of each municipality in this State shall issue to any person who has temporarily lost the use of one or more limbs or is temporarily disabled as to be unable to ambulate without the aid of an

6 placard of not more than six months' duration. Each temporary

handicapped placard issued under the provisions of this section shall

set forth the date on which it shall become invalid.

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The temporary placard shall be granted upon written certification by a physician with a plenary license to practice medicine and surgery or a podiatrist licensed to practice in this State or a bordering state or a physician stationed at a military or naval installation located in this State who is licensed to practice in any state that the person meets the conditions constituting temporary disability as provided in this section. This certification shall be provided on a standard form to be developed by the director in consultation with local chiefs of police and representatives of the handicapped. The form shall contain only those conditions constituting temporary disability as are provided in this section. The physical presence of the handicapped person shall not be required for the issuance of a temporary handicapped placard.

The placard may be renewed one time at the discretion of the issuing authority for a period of not more than six months' duration. The placard shall be displayed on the motor vehicle used by the temporarily handicapped person and shall give the person the right to park overtime or to use special parking places established for use by handicapped persons in any municipality of this State.

The fee for the issuance of such temporary or permanent placard issued pursuant to this section shall be \$4.00 and payable to the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles.

The director may, in addition, issue license plates bearing the national wheelchair symbol for:

- a. Not more than two motor vehicles owned, operated or leased by a handicapped person or by any person furnishing transportation on his behalf; or
- 35 b. Any two motorcycles owned, operated or leased by a 36 handicapped person.
- The fee for the issuance of such plates shall be \$10.00 for each vehicle.

The Assembly Commerce and Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee reports favorably Assembly, No. 678.

A person who is physically handicapped and desires either temporary or permanent handicapped parking privileges in New Jersey must now be certified as handicapped by a physician or podiatrist who is licensed to practice either in this state or in a bordering state. This territorial limitation currently precludes the use of military physicians for such certifications who are assigned to New Jersey military bases and are permitted by the United States Army Medical Command to be licensed in any state.

This bill would permit such physicians to certify that applicants for handicapped license plates, placards for permanent disability, and placards for temporary disabilities up to six months in duration are qualified for such parking privileges.

This bill was prefiled for introduction in the 1996 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.

The Senate Senior Citizens, Veterans' Affairs and Human Services Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 678.

A person who is physically handicapped and desires either temporary or permanent handicapped parking privileges in New Jersey must now be certified as handicapped by a physician or podiatrist who is licensed to practice either in this State or in a bordering state. This territorial limitation currently precludes the use of military physicians for such certifications who are assigned to New Jersey military bases and are permitted by the United States Army Medical Command to be licensed in any state.

This bill would permit such physicians to certify that applicants for handicapped license plates, placards for permanent disability, and placards for temporary disabilities up to six months in duration are qualified for such parking privileges.

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RELEASE: MONDAY DEC. 22, 1997

Gov. Christie Whitman today signed the following pieces of legislation:

A-678, sponsored by Assemblyman Richard H. Bagger (R-Middlesex/Morris/ Somerset/Union), amends state law to allow all licensed physicians at military or naval installations to certify persons with disabilities for handicapped parking privileges. Under previous law, military physicians in New Jersey could provide medical services to their patients, but were unable to certify for disability unless they were licensed in the State of New Jersey. Under federal law, military physicians do not have to be licensed in the state in which they practice.

A-1140, sponsored by Assembly Members Carol Murphy (R-Essex/Morris/Passaic) and Francis Blee (R-Atlantic) and Senators Raymond Zane (D-Salem/Cumberland/Gloucester) and Bill Gormley (R-Atlantic), establishes a venison donation demonstration program in the Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS). The program would authorize the processing and distribution of venison meats donated by recreational hunters to non-profit organizations. The Commissioner of DHSS will promulgate guidelines to implement the program.

A-1217, sponsored by Assemblymen Alan M. Augustine (R-Middlesex/Morris/ Somerset/Union) and Joseph Suliga (D-Union) and Sen. Louis F. Kosco (R-Bergen), clarifies an exemption granted under state law from the licensing provisions of the federal Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Act of 1986. The Act permits states to exempt certain operators of emergency management equipment from the federal licensing requirements. The bill makes clear that the exemption includes the operation of emergency or rescue equipment operated for the purpose of disaster control.

A-2313, sponsored by Assembly Members Rudy Garcia (D-Hudson) and Scott Garrett (R-Sussex/Hunterdon/Morris), allows insurers to deny personal injury protection (PIP) benefits to certain persons who are already insured for PIP benefits under another policy.
