1 AN ACT concerning State college contracts and amending P.L.1986, 2 c.43.

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4 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey:

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- 1. Section 3 of P.L.1986, c.43 (C.18A:64-54) is amended to read as follows:
- 9 3. a. Any purchase, contract or agreement for the performance of 10 any work or the furnishing or hiring of materials or supplies, the cost or price of which, together with any sums expended for the 12 performance of any work or services in connection with the same project or the furnishing of similar materials or supplies during the 14 same fiscal year, paid with or out of college funds, does not exceed the 15 total sum of [\$7,500.00] ¹[\$25,000] \$17,700¹ or, commencing January 16 1,[1985] 1997, the amount determined pursuant to subsection b. of 17 this section, in any fiscal year may be made, negotiated and awarded 18 by a contracting agent, when so authorized by resolution of the board of trustees of the State college without public advertising for bids and 20 bidding therefor.
- 21 b. Commencing January 1, [1985] 1997 and every two years 22 thereafter, the Governor, in consultation with the Department of the 23 Treasury, shall adjust the threshold amount set forth in subsection a. of this section in direct proportion to the rise or fall of the Consumer 25 Price Index for all urban consumers in the New York and Northeastern New Jersey and the Philadelphia areas, as reported by the United 26 States Department of Labor. The adjustment shall become effective 27 on July 1 of the year in which it is reported. 28
- 29 c. Any purchase, contract or agreement made pursuant to this 30 section may be awarded for a period of 12 consecutive months, 31 notwithstanding that the 12-month period does not coincide with the

- 6 4. Every contract or agreement for the performance of any work 7 or the furnishing or hiring of any materials or supplies, the cost or the 8 contract price of which is to be paid with or out of college funds, not 9 included within the terms of section 3 of this article, shall be made and awarded only by the State college after public advertising for bids and 10 bidding therefor, except as provided otherwise in this article or specifically by any other law. No work, materials or supplies shall be undertaken, acquired or furnished for a sum exceeding in the aggregate [\$7,500.00] [\$25,000] [\$17,700] or, commencing January 1, [1985] 1997, the amount determined pursuant to subsection b. of section 3 of [this act] P.L.1986, c.43 (C.18A:64-54), except by written contract or agreement.

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- 3. Section 6 of P.L.1986, c.43 (C.18A:64-57) is amended to read as follows:
- 6. Any purchase, contract, or agreement may be made, negotiated or awarded by a State college without public advertising for bids and bidding therefor, notwithstanding that the cost or contract price will exceed[\$7,500.00] 1 [\$25,000] 1 [\$17,700 1 or, commencing January 1, [1985] 1997, the amount determined pursuant to subsection b. of section 3 of [this act] P.L.1986, c.43 (C.18A:64-54), when an emergency affecting the health, safety or welfare of occupants of college property requires the immediate delivery of the materials or supplies or the performance of the work, if the purchases, contracts or agreements are awarded or made in the following manner:
- a. A written requisition for the performance of the work or the furnishing of materials or supplies, certified by the employee in charge of the building, facility or equipment where the emergency occurred, is filed with the contracting agent or his deputy in charge describing the nature of the emergency, the time of its occurrence, and the need for invoking this section. The contracting agent, or his deputy in charge, being satisfied that the emergency exists, is authorized to award a contract for the work, materials or supplies.
- b. Upon the furnishing of the work, materials or supplies in accordance with the terms of the contract or agreement, the contractor furnishing the work, materials or supplies is entitled to be paid therefor and the State college is obligated for the payment.
- 44 c. The board of trustees may prescribe rules and procedures to 45 implement the requirements of this section.

1 4. Section 27 of P.L.1986, c.43 (C.18A:64-78) is amended to read 2 as follows:

- 27. Any college may, by resolution of its board of trustees, authorize the sale in the following manner of its personal property not needed for college purposes:
 - a. If the estimated fair value of the property to be sold exceeds [\$7,500.00] 1[\$25,000] \$17,700 or, commencing January 1,[1985] 1997, the amount determined pursuant to subsection b. of section 3 of [this act] P.L.1986, c.43 (C.18A:64-54), in any one sale and the property does not consist of perishable goods, it shall be sold at public sale to the highest bidder.
 - b. Notice of the date, time and place of the public sale, together with a description of the items to be sold and the conditions of sale, shall be published once in a legal newspaper. Sales shall be held not less than seven nor more than 14 days after the publication of the notice thereof.
- c. Personal property may be sold to the United States, the State of New Jersey, another college or to any body politic by private sale without advertising for bids.
- d. If no bids are received, the property may then be sold at private sale without further publication or notice thereof but in no event at less than the estimated fair value; or the State college may, if it so elects, reoffer the property at public sale. As used herein, "estimated fair value" means the market value of the property if sold by a willing seller to a willing buyer less the cost to the college of continuing to store or maintain the property.
- e. A State college may reject all bids if it determines a rejection to be in the public interest. In any case in which the college has rejected all bids, it may readvertise the personal property for a subsequent public sale. If it elects to reject all bids at a second public sale pursuant to this section, it may then sell the personal property without further publication or notice thereof at private sale, but in no event shall the negotiated price at the private sale be less than the amount of the highest bid rejected at the preceding two public sales, nor shall the terms or conditions of sale be changed or amended.

Any purchase, contract, or agreement may be made, negotiated or awarded by a State college without public advertising for bids and bidding therefor, notwithstanding that the cost or contract price will exceed [\$7,500.00] 1[\$25.000] \$17,7001 or, commencing January 1, [1985] 1997, the amount determined pursuant to subsection b. of section 3 of [this act] P.L.1986, c.43 (C.18A:64-54), when an emergency affecting the health, safety or welfare of occupants of college property requires the immediate delivery of the materials or supplies or the performance of the work, if the purchases, contracts or agreements are awarded or made in the following manner:
 - a. A written requisition for the performance of the work or the furnishing of materials or supplies, certified by the employee in charge of the building, facility or equipment where the emergency occurred, is filed with the contracting agent or his deputy in charge describing the nature of the emergency, the time of its occurrence, and the need for invoking this section. The contracting agent, or his deputy in charge, being satisfied that the emergency exists, is authorized to award a contract for the work, materials or supplies.
 - b. Upon the furnishing of the work, materials or supplies in accordance with the terms of the contract or agreement, the contractor furnishing the work, materials or supplies is entitled to be paid therefor and the State college is obligated for the payment.

 - b. Notice of the date, time and place of the public sale, together with a description of the items to be sold and the conditions of sale, shall be published once in a legal newspaper. Sales shall be held not less than seven nor more than 14 days after the publication of the notice thereof.
- c. Personal property may be sold to the United States, the State of New Jersey, another college or to any body politic by private sale without advertising for bids.
 - d. If no bids are received, the property may then be sold at private sale without further publication or notice thereof but in no event at less than the estimated fair value; or the State college may, if it so elects, reoffer the property at public sale. As used herein, "estimated fair value" means the market value of the property if sold by a willing seller to a willing buyer less the cost to the college of continuing to store or maintain the property.
 - e. A State college may reject all bids if it determines a rejection to be in the public interest. In any case in which the college has rejected all bids, it may readvertise the personal property for a subsequent public sale. If it elects to reject all bids at a second public sale pursuant to this section, it may then sell the personal property without further publication or notice thereof at private sale, but in no event shall the negotiated price at the private sale be less than the amount of the highest bid rejected at the preceding two public sales, nor shall the terms or conditions of sale be changed or amended.
- f. If the estimated fair value of the property to be sold does not exceed [\$7,500.00] [\$25,000] \$17,700 or, commencing January 1, [1985] 1997, the amount determined pursuant to subsection b. of section 3 of [this act] P.L.1986, c.43 (C.18A:64-54), in any one sale or the property consists of perishable goods, it may be sold at private sale without advertising for bids.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: JUNE 24, 1996

The Senate Education Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 1114 with committee amendments.

As amended, this bill raises the statutory amount of the State college bidding threshold from \$7,500 to \$17,700. The threshold is the amount beyond which public bidding is required. Currently, the threshold is \$11,100, which represents the statutory amount of \$7,500 plus the biennial adjustments which have been made since 1985. Under the bill, the next biennial adjustment would be made on January 1, 1997.

The committee adopted an amendment to lower the bidding threshold from \$25,000 to \$17,700 in order to make it consistent with the threshold recently approved for the New Jersey Institute of Technology, which will be effective on July 1, 1996.
