# STATE OF NEW JERSEY

INTRODUCED APRIL 17, 1980

An Act concerning the compensation of undersheriffs and amending N. J. S. 40A:9-117.

1 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 2 of New Jersey:

1 1. N. J. S. 40A:9–117 is amended to read as follows:

40A:9-117. The sheriff shall select and employ the necessary 2 deputies, chief clerks and other personnel. They shall receive such 3 compensation as shall be recommended by the sheriff and approved 4 by the "[board of chosen freeholders]" "governing body". The 5 6 annual compensation of the undersheriff shall not exceed [34] 90% 7 of the annual compensation of the sheriff. The compensation of the personnel in the office of sheriff shall be paid at the same time 8 9 and in the same manner as the county officers and employees are paid. The limitations of the salaries set herein shall not be con-10strued to restrict any of said employees from participating in or 11 12 benefiting from any cost of living bonus or longevity program provided for or established in the county. 13

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

EXPLANATION—Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law.

Assembly Bill No. 1527 would increase the maximum salary an undersheriff may receive.

Under present statute, an undersheriff's salary may not exceed 75% of the salary of the sheriff. This bill would amend the law to provide that the salary of the undersheriff may not exceed 90% of the salary of the sheriff.

The committee amendment was purely technical in nature to bring the language of the bill into conformity with the provisions of the "Optional County Charter Law" (P. L. 1972, c. 154).

Governor Brendan Byrne today signed the following bills into law:

<u>A-1527</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman Dean Gallo (D-Morris), increases the maximum salary of an Undersheriff from 75 percent to 90 percent of the Sheriff's salary. This salary = increase is not mandatory but allows county freeholders the option to attract more qualified personnel.

<u>A-3539</u>, sponsored by Assemblyman David Schwartz (D-Middlesex), allows the continuation of certain municipally-granted tax abatements and exemptions for improvements to multiple dweilings and conversions of industrial and commercial properties to apartment units. Currently, the exemptions or abatements may last for up to five years <u>or</u> until the property is sold. A-3539 would allow the tax incentives to be transferred with the property title is the full five years.

<u>3-3172</u>, sponsored by Senator Steven Perskie (D-Atlantic), is entitled the "Uniform a-Partisan Elections Law" and, in effect, provides uniform regulations for non-partisan entitieal elections regardless of whether the municipal government is operated as a maxission form, a municipal manager form, a village or under the Falkner Act (Optional entities). Some of the new regulations include the requirement that candidate's have signatures equal to one percent of the registered voters; that the filing while is 47 days before the election; the commencement of the term be July 1st and that that may approve a runoff election.

A-2122, sponsored by Assemblyman James Bornheimer (D-Middlesex), removes a number of octions on the establishment of branch offices by savings and loan institutions.
