#### STATE OF NEW JERSEY

#### INTRODUCED JANUARY 20, 1994

#### By Senator LITTELL

	AN ACT	providing	for	concurrent	criminal	jurisdiction	between
the United States and the State over certain federal properties.							

## BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. a. The State cedes to the United States concurrent criminal jurisdiction over lands and waters within the boundaries of units of the National Park System administered by the United States Department of the Interior, National Park Service, that are within the State, including those owned, leased, or administratively controlled, and those hereafter acquired, leased, or administratively controlled, by the National Park Service.
- b. The existing National Park Service units affected by this cession are as follows:
  - (1) Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area;
  - (2) The Sandy Hook Unit of Gateway National Recreation Area;
  - (3) Morristown National Historic Park;
  - (4) Thomas Edison National Historic Site; and
  - (5) Ellis Island.
  - 2. Cession of jurisdiction pursuant to section 1 of P.L. c.
- (C. )(now pending before the Legislature as this bill) shall become effective upon acceptance thereof in writing by an authorized official of the United States on behalf of the United States, which shall be transmitted to, and filed in, the office of the Secretary of State of New Jersey, and a copy thereof shall be published in the New Jersey Register.
- 3. Whenever the United States relinquishes all or part of its jurisdiction theretofore held by it over lands and waters within the State, ceded to the United States pursuant to sections 1 and 2 of P.L. c. (C. )(now pending before the Legislature as this bill), the Governor may accept, on behalf of the State, the jurisdiction so relinquished. The acceptance shall be in writing and shall be transmitted to the authorized official of the United States, and a copy thereof shall be filed with the office of the Secretary of State of New Jersey and published in the New Jersey Register.
  - 4. This act shall take effect immediately.
