The Assembly Local Government Committee favorably reports an Assembly Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 1702 and Assembly Bill No. 2463.

Assembly Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 1702 and Assembly Bill No. 2463 would permit a county to establish a trust fund from which expenditures of county and State funds shall be disbursed for various social service programs. These social service programs include services provided by county psychiatric facilities and by county welfare agencies for aid to families with dependent children (AFDC) and other similar programs.

Currently, counties are required to reflect in their budgets the total cost of these services, which represents the State-paid portion and the county-paid portion of the cost of the service. Many county governing bodies feel that the reflection in the county budget of the State-paid portion of these costs is misleading to the public, since the county is not required to raise tax dollars to cover these costs. The segregation of these human service costs into a special trust fund will facilitate budget change analysis by the general public. A county would be required to report a summary of the anticipated State aid and the county share for each program included in the trust fund in its the freeholders' annual budget message.

The Senate Community Affairs Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 1702.

This bill would require each county to separate in its budget human services costs paid for by the state from those human services costs paid for by the county.

The bill would define "net State takeover cost" as the net amount required to be paid by a county to the State to satisfy the county's share of the cost of human services as provided by law. These human services costs are for services provided by county psychiatric facilities and county welfare agencies for aid to families with dependent children (AFDC) and other similar programs.

Currently, counties are required to reflect in their budgets the total cost of these services, which represents the State-paid portion and the county-paid portion of the cost of the service. Many county governing bodies believe that the reflection in the county budget of the State-paid portion of these costs is misleading to the public, since the county is not required to raise tax dollars to cover these costs. The segregation of these human service costs into on-budget and off-budget categories will help clarify that amount which must actually be raised by county taxpayers for this purpose.
