AN ACT establishing the New Jersey Commission on ¹[Indian]
 Native American ¹ Affairs and supplementing Title 52 of the
 Revised Statutes.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

7 1. There is established in the Department of State the New 8 Jersey Commission on ¹[Indian] Native American Affairs. The commission shall consist of ⁴[seven] nine⁴ members: the 9 10 Secretary of State, serving ex officio, and ⁴[six] eight ⁴ public members, not more than ⁴[three] four ⁴ of whom shall be from the 11 12 same political party⁴[, who shall]. Two of the public members shall be members of the Nanticoke Lenni Lenape Indians, to be 13 14 appointed by the Governor on the recommendation of the Confederation of the Nanticoke Lenni Lenape Tribes and with the 15 16 advice and consent of the Senate. Two of the public members shall be members of the Ramapough Mountain Indians, to be 17 18 appointed by the Governor on the recommendation of the Ramapough Mountain Indians and with the advice and consent of 19 the Senate. Two of the public members shall be members of the 20 Powhatan Renape Nation, to be appointed by the Governor on the 21 22 recommendation of the Powhatan Renape Nation and with the advice and consent of the Senate. Two of the public members 23 24 shall be members of the Intertribal People, to be appointed by the Governor on the recommendation of the Intertribal People and 25 with the advice and consent of the Senate. "Intertribal People" 26 means Native Americans who reside in New Jersey but are not 27 members of the Nanticoke Lenni Lenape Indians, the Ramapough 28 Mountain Indians, or the Powhatan Renape Nation. 4 4[be 29 appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the 30 Senate, based upon recommendations made by the American 31 32 Indian Council of

New Jersey. 14

2. Each public member shall serve for a term of two years, except that of the members first appointed, 4[three] four shall serve for a term of one year and 4[three] four shall serve for a term of two years. Public members shall be eligible for reappointment and shall serve until their successors are appointed and qualified. A vacancy occurring other than by expiration of term shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment was made but for the unexpired term only. Commission members shall serve without compensation but shall

The commission shall organize as soon as may be practicable after the appointment of its members and shall annually elect a chairperson from among its public members and may appoint a secretary who need not be a member of the commission. The commission shall meet at least once every three months and upon the call of the chairperson or of a majority of its members. The presence of a majority of the membership of the commission shall be required for the conduct of official business.

The Assembly State Government Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly Bill No. 1134.

This bill establishes the New Jersey Commission on Native American Affairs in the Department of State.

The commission is to consist of seven members: the Secretary of State is to serve ex officio, and six public members are to be appointed on a bipartisan basis by the Governor based upon recommendations made by the American Indian Council of New Jersey and subject to confirmation by the Senate. The terms of public members are to be for two years.

Commission members are to serve without compensation but shall be entitled to reimbursement for all necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

The commission shall:

- a. develop programs and projects relating to the cultural, educational and social development of New Jersey's Native American communities;
- b. develop programs and projects which further understanding of New Jersey's Native American history and culture;
- c. promote increased cooperation among all Native American communities in the State;
- d. serve as a Statewide reference and resource center to increase public knowledge of New Jersey's Native American heritage;
- e. act as a liaison among Native American communities, the State and federal governments, and educational, social and cultural institutions; and
- f. study the status of all Native American groups in the State and assist them in obtaining recognition from the State and federal governments.

The commission shall submit an annual report on its activities to the Governor and the Legislature.

This bill was introduced in the 1994 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review which has been performed.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

The committee adopted amendments to this bill to replace references to "Indian" with references to "Native American".

The Senate State Government Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Assembly Bill No. 1134 [2R].

This bill establishes the New Jersey Commission on Native American Affairs in the Department of State.

The commission is to consist of seven members: the Secretary of State is to serve ex officio, and six public members are to be appointed on a bipartisan basis by the Governor based upon recommendations made by the American Indian Council of New Jersey and subject to confirmation by the Senate. The terms of public members are to be for two years.

Commission members are to serve without compensation but shall be entitled to reimbursement for all necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

The commission shall:

- a. develop programs and projects relating to the cultural, educational and social development of New Jersey's Native American communities;
- b. develop programs and projects which further understanding of New Jersey's Native American history and culture;
- c. promote increased cooperation among all Native American communities in the State;
- d. serve as a Statewide reference and resource center to increase public knowledge of New Jersey's Native American heritage; and
- e. act as a liaison among Native American communities, the State and federal governments, and educational, social and cultural institutions.

The commission shall submit an annual report on its activities to the Governor and the Legislature.

[SECOND REPRINT] ASSEMBLY, No. 1134

Assembly Bill No. 1134 (2R) of 1994 establishes the New Jersey Commission on Native American Affairs in the Department of State. The commission shall consist of seven members who shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for all necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. The commission shall consist of the Secretary of State and six public members who shall be appointed on a bipartisan basis by the Governor based upon the recommendations made by the American Indian Council of New Jersey. The commission shall: a) develop programs and projects relating to the cultural, educational and social development of New Jersey's Native American communities; b) develop programs and projects which further understanding of New Jersey's Native American history and culture; c) promote increased cooperation among all Native American communities in the State; d) serve as a Statewide reference and resource center to increase public knowledge of New Jersey's Native American heritage; e) act as a liaison among Native American communities, the State and federal governments, and educational, social and cultural institutions; and f) study the status of all Native American groups in the State and assist them in obtaining recognition from the State and federal governments. The commission shall submit an annual report on its activities to the Governor and the Legislature.

An estimate provided by the Department of State for a similar bill in 1992 places the cost of implementing this bill at \$97,757 in the first year following enactment. However, the earlier bill, unlike the current bill, would have allowed the commission to employ a professional staff. After subtracting personnel costs and a \$10,000 expenditure for computer equipment from the department's estimate, the Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates that enactment of this bill would result in State expenditures of \$17,000 a year. This amount would provide for materials and supplies, clerical services, and the expenses of commission members.

This legislative fiscal estimate has been produced by the Office of Legislative Services due to the failure of the Executive Branch to respond to our request for a fiscal note.

This fiscal estimate has been prepared pursuant to P.L.1980, c.67.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 1134 (Third Reprint)

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1134 (Third Reprint) with my objections for reconsideration.

Summary of Bill

This bill establishes the New Jersey Commission on Native American Affairs ("Commission") in the Department of State. The Commission is to consist of seven members: the Secretary of State and six public members appointed by me on a bipartisan basis based on recommendations by a group known as the American Indian Council of New Jersey and subject to confirmation by the Senate. The terms of public members are to be for two years, except that three of the initial members shall serve one-year terms.

The Commission will develop programs and projects relating to the cultural, educational and social development of New Jersey's Native American communities and act as a liaison among Native American communities, the State and federal governments, and educational, social and cultural institutions.

Recommended Action

This bill's goal of creating a Commission on Native American
Affairs to foster education about and communication among New Jersey's various Native American communities is laudable. It is important to ensure that the membership of any such commission include equal representation by all of New Jersey's Native American communities.

Consequently, I recommend that the Commission's membership be expanded to nine, with the Secretary of State serving as an ex officio member and two members from each of New Jersey's three officially recognized Native American tribes: the Nanticoke Lenni Lenape Indians, the Ramapough Mountain Indians, and the Powhatan Renape Nation. The Commission's remaining two positions would be filled by members of the Intertribal People: Native Americans residing in New Jersey who are not members of any of the three officially recognized tribes.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill No. 1134 (Third Reprint) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

"Intertribal People" means Native Americans who reside in New Jersey but are not members of the Nanticoke Lenni Lenape Indians, the Ramapough Mountain Indians, or the Powhatan Renape Nation."
