### STATE OF NEW JERSEY

#### ADOPTED FEBRUARY 23, 1995

1 AN ACT providing for the issuance of certain license plates for 2 the purpose of assisting in the support and funding of historic 3 preservation projects, and supplementing chapter 3 of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes. 4 5 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the 6 7 State of New Jersey: 8 1. As used in this act: "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Environmental 9 10 Protection; "Department" means the Department of Environmental 11 12 Protection: "Director" means the Director of the Division of Motor 13 Vehicles in the Department of Law and Public Safety; 14 15 "Division" means the Division of Motor Vehicles in the Department of Law and Public Safety; 16 "Fund" means the "Historic Preservation License Plate Fund" 17 18 created pursuant to section 4 of this act. "Historic resources" means the historic resources in New 19 20 Jersey, and shall include, but need not necessarily be limited to, buildings, sites, and structures listed in or eligible for listing in 21 22 the New Jersey Register of Historic Places, and museums and 23 library collections related to New Jersey history. 24 2. The Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles shall, upon proper application therefor, issue historic preservation license 25 plates for any motor vehicle owned or leased and registered in 26 the State. In addition to the registration number and other 27 markings or identification otherwise prescribed by law, an 28 29historic preservation license plate shall display words or a slogan and an emblem indicating support for, or an interest in, historic 30 31 preservation. The words or slogan and emblem shall be chosen by the director in consultation with the Historic Preservation 32 License Plate Advisory Committee established pursuant to 33 34 subsection a. of section 4 of this act; however, the director shall solicit, in conjunction with the Legislature, input from the 35 general public on the design of the plate and shall review the 36 37 submissions prior to choosing the design. Issuance of historic preservation license plates in accordance with this section shall 38 39 be subject to the provisions of chapter 3 of Title 39 of the 40 Revised Statutes, except as hereinafter otherwise specifically 41 provided.

EXPLANATION--Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law.

Matter enclosed in superscript numerals has been adopted as follows: <sup>1</sup> Assembly AAP committee amendments adopted June 1, 1995. 3. a. Application for issuance of an historic preservation license plate shall be made to the division on forms and in a manner as may be prescribed by the director. In order to be deemed complete, an application shall be accompanied by a fee of \$50 payable to the division, which fee shall be in addition to all fees otherwise required by law for the registration of the motor vehicle.

8 b. The annual fee for the registration certificate of a motor 9 vehicle that has been issued an historic preservation license plate pursuant to the provisions of this act shall include in each year 10 subsequent to the year of issuance a fee in the amount of \$10, 11 which fee shall be in addition to all fees otherwise required by 12 law for the renewal of the registration of the motor vehicle and 13 shall be collected by the division and deposited in the Historic 14 Preservation License Plate Fund created pursuant to section 4 of 15 this act. 16

4. a. There is created in the Department of Environmental 17 18 Protection a special non-lapsing fund to be known as the "Historic Preservation License Plate Fund." The fund shall be 19 20 administered by the New Jersey Historic Trust. There shall be 21 deposited in the fund the amount collected from all license plate 22 fees collected pursuant to section 3 of this act, less the amounts 23 necessary to reimburse the division for administrative costs 24 pursuant to section 5 of this act. Monies deposited in the fund 25 shall be dedicated for use in the awarding of grants to State agencies, local government units, and qualifying tax-exempt 26 27 nonprofit organizations to meet costs related to the physical preservation of, development of interpretive and educational 28 29 programming for, or operation of New Jersey's historic 30 resources. Approval of any grants shall be made by the "Historic 31 Preservation License Plate Advisory Committee," which shall be established in the Department of Environmental Protection and 32 33 shall comprise the following: the Chairman of the Board of 34 Trustees of the New Jersey Historic Trust, and two other trustees thereof, one of whom shall be the Executive Director of the New 35 36 Jersey Historical Commission; a representative of Preservation New Jersey; a representative of the New Jersey Association of 37 38 Museums; a representative of the League of Historical Societies of New Jersey; a representative of the New Jersey Council for 39 the Social Studies; <sup>1</sup>a representative of the New Jersey Council 40 on the Humanities;<sup>1</sup> and the Administrator of the Historic 41 Preservation Office in the Department of Environmental 42 Protection. 43

b. Monies deposited in the fund shall be held in 44 45 interest-bearing accounts in public depositories as defined 46 pursuant to section 1 of P.L.1970, c.236 (C.17:9-41), and may be invested or reinvested in such securities as are approved by the 47 State Treasurer. Interest or other income earned on monies 48 49 deposited in the fund, and any monies which may be appropriated or otherwise become available for the purposes of the fund, shall 50 be credited to and deposited in the fund for use as set forth in 51 52 this act.

53 5. a. Prior to the deposit of license plate fees collected 54 pursuant to section 3 of this act into the fund, amounts thereof as are necessary shall be used to reimburse the division for all costs
 reasonably and actually incurred, as stipulated by the director,
 for:

4 (1) producing, issuing, renewing, and publicizing the availability
5 of historic preservation license plates; and

6 (2) any initial computer programming changes that may be 7 necessary to implement the historic preservation license plate 8 program established by this act.

b. The director shall annually certify to the commissioner the
average cost per license plate incurred in the immediately
preceding year by the division in producing, issuing, renewing, and
publicizing the availability of historic preservation license
plates. The annual certification of the average cost per license
plate shall be approved by the Joint Budget Oversight
Committee, or its successor.

16 c. In the event that the average cost per license plate as 17 certified by the director and approved by the Joint Budget 18 Oversight Committee, or its successor, is greater than the \$50 19 application fee established in subsection a. of section 3 of this 20 act in two consecutive fiscal years, the director may discontinue 21 the issuance of historic preservation license plates.

22 6. The director shall notify eligible motorists of the 23 opportunity to obtain historic preservation license plates by 24 including a notice with all motor vehicle registration renewals, and by posting appropriate posters or signs in all division 25 26 facilities and offices, as may be provided by the department. The 27 notices, posters, and signs shall be designed by the Historic 28 Preservation License Plate Advisory Committee with the 29 approval of the commissioner. The designs shall be subject to the 30 approval of the director, and the commissioner shall supply the 31 division with the notices, posters, and signs to be circulated or posted by that division. 32

33 The commissioner, the New Jersey Historic Trust, the 7 His oric Preservation License Plate Advisory Committee, the 34 35 director, and the State Treasurer shall develop and enter into an interagency memorandum of agreement setting forth the 36 procedures to be followed by the departments, the New Jersey 37 Historic Trust, the Historic Preservation License Plate Advisory 38 Committee, and the division in carrying out their respective 39 responsibilities under this act. 40

This act shall take effect on the 180th day after enactment, but the Commissioner of Environmental Protection, the New Jersey Historic Trust, the Historic Preservation License Plate Advisory Committee, the State Treasurer, and the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles may take such anticipatory acts in advance of that date as may be necessary for the timely implementation of this act upon the effective date thereof.

The Assembly Environment and Energy Committee favorably reports an Assembly committee substitute for Assembly Bill No. 1903.

The committee substitute would direct the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to establish a special historic preservation license plate program. The special plates would contain markings or identification expressing the vehicle owner's support for, or interest in, historic preservation. The Director of the DMV, in consultation with the Historic Preservation License Plate Advisory Committee established by the bill, would select the design of the license plate, after soliciting, in conjunction with the Legislature, input from the general public and reviewing those submissions. A \$50 fee would be charged for the issuance of the plates, and an additional \$10 fee would be collected for each annual renewal.

The committee substitute would create in the Department of Environmental Protection а special non-lapsing "Historic Preservation License Plate Fund, which would be administered by the New Jersey Historic Trust. All license plate fees collected pursuant to the committee substitute, less the amounts necessary to reimburse the DMV for administrative costs as provided in the committee substitute, would be deposited in the fund. Monies deposited in the fund would be dedicated for use in the awarding of grants to State agencies, local government units, and qualifying tax-exempt nonprofit organizations to meet costs related to the physical preservation of, development of interpretive and educational programming for, or operation of New Jersey's historic resources. Approval of any grants would be made by the "Historic Preservation License Plate Advisory Committee," which would be established in the Department of Environmental Protection and would comprise the following: the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the New Jersey Historic Trust, and two other trustees thereof, one of whom would be the Executive Director of the New Jersey Historical Commission; a representative of Preservation New Jersey; a representative of the New Jersey Association of Museums; a representative of the League of Historical Societies of New Jersey; a representative of the New Jersey Council for the Social Studies; and the Administrator of the Historic Preservation Office in the Department of Environmental Protection. Interest or other income earned on monies deposited in the fund, and any monies that may be appropriated or otherwise become available for the purposes of the fund, would be credited to and deposited in the fund.

Costs incurred by the DMV in producing, issuing, renewing, and publicizing historic preservation license plates, as annually certified by the DMV director, would be reimbursed from the fees collected. The DMV would also be authorized to use a portion of the fees collected to pay for the cost of any computer programming changes that may be necessary to implement the license plate program.

The committee substitute would direct the DMV to include in all mailings of motor vehicle registration renewals a notice of the availability of historic preservation license plates.

The committee substitute would require the Joint Budget Oversight Committee to approve the DMV's annual certification of the average cost to produce, issue, renew, and publicize the availability of a license plate. If the average annual cost exceeds \$50 for two consecutive fiscal years, the division would be authorized to discontinue the issuance of these license plates.

The Assembly Appropriations Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 1903 (Acs), with committee amendments.

Assembly Bill No. 1903 (Acs), as amended, would direct the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to establish a special historic preservation license plate program. The special plates would contain markings or identification expressing the vehicle owner's support for, or interest in, historic preservation. The Director of the DMV, in consultation with the Historic Preservation License Plate Advisory Committee established by the bill, would select the design of the license plate, after soliciting, in conjunction with the Legislature, input from the general public and reviewing those submissions. A \$50 fee would be charged for the issuance of the plates, and an additional \$10 fee would be collected for each annual renewal.

The Legislation would create in the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) a special non-lapsing "Historic Preservation License Plate Fund, which would be administered by the New Jersey Historic Trust. All license plate fees collected pursuant to the legislation, less the amounts necessary to reimburse the DMV for administrative costs, would be deposited in the fund. Monies deposited in the fund would be dedicated for use in the awarding of grants to State agencies, local government units, and qualifying tax-exempt nonprofit organizations to meet costs related to the physical preservation of, development of interpretive and educational programming for, or operation of New Jersey's historic resources. Approval of any grants would be made by the "Historic Preservation License Plate Advisory Committee," which would be established in the Department of Environmental Protection and the Chairman of the Board of would comprise the following: Trustees of the New Jersey Historic Trust, and two other trustees thereof, one of whom would be the Executive Director of the New Jersey Historical Commission; a representative of Preservation New Jersey; a representative of the New Jersey Association of Museums; a representative of the League of Historical Societies of New Jersey; a representative of the New Jersey Council for the Social Studies; the Administrator of the Historic Preservation Office in the Department of Environmental Protection and a representative from the New Jersey Council on the Humanities.

#### FISCAL IMPACT:

Based on information from the DMV, revenue from the plates would be approximately \$200,000 in the first year, \$140,000 and \$160,000 in the second and third years, respectively. The revenue would offset DMV costs for net amounts of \$127,520, \$124,260 and \$144,260 in the first three years. This is based on 4,000 motorists initially ordering the plates, and then 2,000 new plates in the second and third years, with everyone renewing annually.

#### **COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS**:

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The amendments add a representative from the New Jersey Council on the Humanities to this license plate advisory committee.

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 1903 ACS [1R].

Assembly Bill No. 1903 ACS [1R] permits the issuance of special historic preservation license plates by the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) in the Department of Transportation. The initial charge for the new license plate would be \$50, with an annual renewal fee of \$10. These fees would be in addition to all other motor vehicle fees otherwise required by law.

Fee revenues will be deposited into a non-lapsing "Historic Preservation License Plate Fund," created by the bill. The fund will be administered by the New Jersey Historic Trust and dedicated for grants to State agencies, local government units, and qualifying tax-exempt nonprofit organizations to meet costs related to the preservation and operation of New Jersey's historic resources. The DMV will be reimbursed from the revenues generated by the sale of the special historic preservation license plates for costs incurred in producing, issuing, renewing and publicizing the plates, as well as for initial computer programming changes needed.

The DMV currently issues special fundraising license plates for animal welfare, shore protection, wildlife conservation and the Battleship U.S.S. New Jersey.

The New Jersey Historic Trust supports this bill.

As reported, this bill is identical to Senate Bill No. 2071 [1R] of 1995 (Kyrillos).

#### FISCAL IMPACT

In a legislative fiscal estimate prepared on an identical Senate bill by the Office of Legislative Services on November 13, 1995, it was estimated that the enactment of this bill will result in gross annual revenues of \$200,000 in the first year following enactment and \$140,000 and \$160,000 in the next two years, respectively. The revenues would offset DMV's costs and produce net surpluses of \$136,920, \$124,260 and \$144,260 in the first three years, respectively, for deposit in the Historic Preservation License Plate Fund.

The Division of Motor Vehicles estimates the cost to implement this bill at \$63,080 in the first year following enactment and \$15,740 in the second and third year following enactment.

According to the DMV, 4,000 animal welfare license plates were sold in the first year after enactment of the law permitting their issuance and approximately 2,000 are expected to be sold in the second year. Therefore, it is estimated that approximately the same number of motorists would apply for historic preservation license plates in the first year, that 2,000 additional plates would be sold in each of the second and third years after enactment, and that all plate holders will renew their plates.
