#### P.L.1995, CHAPTER 409, approved January 10, 1996 1994 Assembly No. 792 (Third Reprint)

AN ACT concerning environmental education, supplementing chapter 6 of Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes, repealing P.L.1971. c.279, and making an appropriation.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. a. There is hereby created in but not of the Department of Environmental Protection the New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education. The commission shall consist of 1[21] <sup>2</sup>[22<sup>1</sup>] 23<sup>2</sup> public members, the commissioners, or their designees, of the Department of Education, 1[the Department of Higher Education,]1 the Department of Environmental Protection, and the Department of Health, the <sup>1</sup>[environmental prosecutor] Attorney General 1 or a designee 1 with responsibility in the area of environmental law, the Executive Director of the Commission on Higher Education<sup>1</sup>, and a designee of the governor. The public members shall consist of two college professors in the fields of environmental education or environmental science; one private school teacher and two public school teachers, one of whom is selected by the New Jersey Education Association, including one teacher from <sup>1</sup>[kindergarden] kindergarten<sup>1</sup> to third grade, one from fourth to sixth grade, and one from seventh to twelfth grade; one school administrator; 1 one representative of the New Jersey Principals and Supervisors Association: 1 one local school board representative selected by the New Jersey School Board Association; one member of <sup>2</sup>[the clergy] an interfaith religious organization<sup>2</sup>; one representative from labor; one representative from industry; two representatives from environmental or public interest organizations; two representatives from cultural institutions such as museums and nature centers; two representatives from the field of environmental health; two non-academic science professionals; two representatives from the agricultural community; 2[and]2 one student representative from a student environmental organization, such as Kids Against Pollution 2; and one representative from the South Jersey Environmental Information Center<sup>2</sup>.

b. The public members shall be appointed by the <sup>1</sup>[governor] Governor<sup>1</sup> for terms of three years, except that the student representative shall be appointed for a term of one year, and in the first year the other public members shall be appointed to staggered terms as follows:

(1) [Six] Seven shall be appointed to terms of one year;

Advise and oversee the implementation of the Plan of Action <sup>1</sup>[which] that <sup>1</sup> was adopted by the Commission on Environmental Education <sup>1</sup>[established] created <sup>1</sup> by Executive Order Number 205 of 1989 and <sup>1</sup>reconvened as the New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education by Executive Order Number 111 of 1993 <sup>1</sup>;
- b. Develop and maintain, with the assistance of the various agencies and departments, a bi-annual inventory of the environmental education resources that are available in all State agencies and departments;
- c. Develop and maintain an Environmental Education Network of activities, resources and model programs throughout the State;
- d. Organize a global forum on environmental education to be held every three to five years;
- e. Organize and support an annual Environmental Education Week:
- f. Support such other environmental education activities as the commission determines are appropriate;
- g. Provide technical assistance to the Legislature for legislation related to environmental education; and
- h. Submit an annual report on the status of environmental education to the Governor and the Legislature.
  - 3. The <sup>3</sup>[State Board of Education shall:
- a. Integrate environmental education into the State's curriculum frameworks, proficiencies and assessment programs, including the fourth grade, eighth grade, and eleventh grade State tests, except that environmental education shall not be a graduation requirement; Inter-agency Work Group, created pursuant to section 4 of P.L. c. (C. ) (now pending before the Legislature as this bill), may:<sup>3</sup>
- <sup>3</sup>[b.] <u>a.</u><sup>3</sup> Publicize existing model environmental education programs;
- <sup>3</sup>[c.] <u>b.</u><sup>3</sup> Provide leadership and coordination in conducting teacher in-service programs throughout the State;
- <sup>3</sup>[d.] <u>c.</u><sup>3</sup> Solicit public and private partnerships at the local, State and national levels to provide teacher education programs; and
- 51 3[e.] d.3 Provide the commission with information concerning 52 the availability of environmental education to students in the 53 State.
  - 4. There is created an Inter-agency Work Group, which shall

consist of the commissioner <sup>1</sup>or secretary<sup>1</sup>, or his designee, of each of the principal departments. This work group shall meet periodically to coordinate the environmental education efforts of the various departments and agencies in the State.

5. 3[a.]3 The Environmental Education Fund is established as a nonlapsing revolving fund in the Department of Environmental Protection. The fund shall be administered by the commission, and shall be credited with all moneys appropriated by this act and with grant moneys or any other revenue obtained by the commission for the purpose of environmental education. Interest received on moneys in the fund shall be credited to the fund.

<sup>3</sup>[b. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Environmental Education Fund <sup>1</sup>[\$300,000, of which \$150,000 shall be from fines and penalties collected for violations of environmental laws] the sum of \$75,000<sup>1</sup>. There is allocated from the Environmental Education Fund <sup>1</sup>[\$200,000] the sum of \$50,000<sup>1</sup> to the Environmental Education Commission and <sup>1</sup>[\$100,000] the sum of \$25,000<sup>1</sup> to the State Board of Education, to be used for the purposes set forth in sections 2 and 3 of this act.]<sup>3</sup>

6. P.L.1971, c.279 <sup>1</sup>(C.18A:6-80 et seq.)<sup>1</sup> is hereby repealed.

The Commission on Environmental Education, which was created by Executive Order <sup>1</sup>Number <sup>1</sup> 205 of 1989 <sup>1</sup>and reconvened as the New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education by Executive Order Number 111 of 1993 <sup>1</sup>, is abolished <sup>1</sup>as of the date of the first meeting of the New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education created by this act <sup>1</sup>.

#### **STATEMENT**

This bill would create a permanent Environmental Education Commission in the Department of Environmental Protection for the purpose of implementing the proposals of the Commission on Environmental Education, which was created by Executive Order 205 of 1989. The "Environmental Education Act," P.L.1971, c.279. is repealed because the authority granted to the Commissioner of Education to promote environmental education in the State would be vested in the Environmental Education Commission and the Office of Environmental Education.

The temporary Commission on Environmental Education, created by Executive Order, is abolished because the bill replaces the commission with a permanent commission with a different composition and purpose.

### STATE OF NEW JERSEY

The Assembly Environment and Energy Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 792 with committee amendments.

As amended and reported by the committee, this bill would create a 28-member permanent New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education in but not of the Department of Environmental Protection for the purpose of implementing the proposals of the Commission on Environmental Education, which was created by Executive Order Number 205 of 1989 and reconvened as the New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education by Executive Order Number 111 of 1993. The commission would also develop a bi-annual inventory of the State's environmental education resources and an environmental education network of activities, resources and model programs. In addition, the commission would organize global forums on environmental education and an annual environmental education week. Finally, the commission would assist in the development of environmental education legislation.

The bill would also mandate that the State Board of Education integrate environmental education into the State's curriculum frameworks, proficiencies and assessment programs, publicize existing model environmental education programs, coordinate teacher in-service programs, solicit public and private assistance in the provision of teacher education programs, and provide the commission with information concerning the availability of environmental education to students in the State.

The bill would create an Inter-agency Work Group to coordinate environmental education activities and efforts among the principal State departments.

An Environmental Education Fund, to be administered by the commission, would be created in the Department of Environmental Protection to receive appropriations and other revenue. The bill would appropriate \$75,000 to the fund from the General Fund. Of this amount, \$50,000 would be allocated to the commission and \$25,000 would be allocated to the State Board of Education.

The bill would repeal the "Environmental Education Act," P.L.1971, c.279 (C.18A:6-80 et seq.), because the authority granted to the Commissioner of Education to promote environmental education in the State would be vested instead in the New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education created in the bill.

The temporary Commission on Environmental Education (renamed the New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education), created by Executive Order, would be abolished in favor of the permanent commission created in the bill.

The committee amended the bill to: replace the Chancellor of Higher Education with the Executive Director of the Commission on Higher Education as a member of the New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education; replace the Environmental Prosecutor with the Attorney General, or a designee thereof with responsibility in the area of environmental law, as a member of the commission; add a representative of the New Jersey Principals and Supervisors Association to the commission, thus raising the total membership of the commission from 27 to 28 persons, of whom 22 would be public members; provide for the election of a chairperson and a vice-chairperson of the commission for two-year terms; reduce the appropriation from \$300,000 to \$75,000 and change the allocation formula therefor in the bill accordingly; remove the reference to fines and penalties for violations of environmental laws as a source that appropriation; provide that the current temporary commission would remain in existence until the new permanent commission created by the bill holds its first meeting; and update references to executive orders affecting the current temporary commission. The committee also made technical and clarifying amendments to the bill.

This bill was pre-filed for introduction in the 1994-95 session pending technical review. As reported, the bill includes the changes required by technical review, which has been performed.

- 9. The Council is to convene at least four meetings a year in such places as it determines to be necessary to conduct Council business. It may also convene forums or hearings as it determines appropriate and necessary to carry out its duties.
- 10. Public meetings are to be announced and open and accessible to the general public, unless there is a valid reason for an executive session (Section 105(f) of the Act).

#### **EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 111**

WHEREAS, The citizens of the State of New Jersey have an inherent right to a healthy environment; and

WHEREAS, There is a direct relationship between the health of the environment and the level of environmental awareness among the State's citizenry; and

Whereas, Environmental education is an integral part of a complete educational experience for students at the elementary, secondary and post-secondary levels; and

Whereas, Environmental education should be an integral part of a lifelong learning process that involves both the formal education that occurs in school and the informal education that occurs in all walks of life; and

Whereas, The New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education was originally convened by former Governor Thomas Kean in 1989 pursuant to Executive Order No. 205; and

Whereas, The New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education was created to identify for the Governor the knowledge, attitudes, values, behaviors and skills that should be recommended for the development of an environmental education master plan; and

Whereas, The New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education has identified the knowledge, attitudes, values, skills and behaviors that an environmentally literate citizenry should acquire, and has codified a Plan of Action for developing such a citizenry through the implementation of a variety of strategies; and

Whereas, there exists a need to achieve the goals set forth in the Plan of Action developed by the Commission, thus warranting the reconvening of the Commission.

Now, Therefore, I, JAMES J. FLORIO, Governor of the State of New Jersey, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and by the Statutes of this State, do hereby ORDER AND DIRECT:

1. There is hereby reconvened the New Jersey Commission on Environmental Education, which shall consist of 27 members, as follows:

A. Three public or private school teachers, one from each of the following groupings: grades kindergarten to third, grades fourth to sixth, and grades seventh to twelfth; de env fie als ins

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on Envilows: each of , grades B. Two representatives of each of the following groups: academia in the fields of environmental education and/or environmental science; non-partisan, public interest groups; the field of environmental health; non-academic science professionals; the agricultural community; labor/industry; cultural institutions including, but not limited to, organizations such as museums and nature centers;

C. One representative of each of the following: clergy; school administration; a local school board; and a student representative (grade nine through undergraduate levels);

D. The Commissioners of the following State Departments, or their designees: Education; Higher Education; Environmental Protection and Energy; and Health; and

E. Also included are the Environmental Prosecutor, or a designee; and a representative from the Governor's Office.

The public members shall be appointed by the Governor for terms of three years, and in the first year the public members shall be appointed to staggered terms as follows:

Seven shall be appointed to terms of one year;

(3) Seven shall be appointed to terms of three years.

The Governor shall appoint a chair to the Commission from among its membership, who shall serve in such position at the pleasure of the Governor.

C. Support an annual Environmental Education Week and other activities designed to foster environmental awareness;

D. Report to the Governor as requested on issues relating to environmental education; and

E. Submit an annual report to the Governor on the status of environmental education in the State.

3. There is hereby convened an Environmental Education Executive Committee of nine members, established as a subgroup of the Environmental Education Commission, which shall

be chaired by the Chair of the Commission with the Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Protection and Energy and the Commissioner of the Department of Education as vice-chairs, and shall consist of the Commissioners of the following State Departments, or their designees: Higher Education; Health; and Law and Public Safety. The Executive Committee shall also consist of a representative from the Governor's Office and two representatives from the Commission, to be designated by the Governor.

The Chair shall preside over the meetings of the Executive Committee, and shall administer the agenda as submitted by the Committee.

- 4. The Executive Committee shall meet at least once every other month, beginning in the month following the effective date of this Order, and shall:
- A. Enhance communication with and coordinate the involvement of State departments, including but not limited to those departments represented on the Commission in the implementation of the Plan of Action;
- B. In consultation with the Environmental Education Commission, utilize monies available through the Environmental Education Trust Fund, administered by the Department of Environmental Protection and Energy, in order to achieve the goals and objectives of the Plan of Action;
- C. Conduct an inventory of each State Department, the formal and non-formal education communities, business and industry, environmental groups and organizations, municipal and county government, and civic, youth and religious organizations in the area of environmental education and identify potential areas where environmental education can be infused into government operations.
- D. Communicate the findings of the inventory to the Commission at its regularly scheduled meetings, work with the Commission in preparing its annual report, and otherwise establish a "clearinghouse" of information for an environmental education network.

Upon the request of four of the Executive Committee members, the Chair shall schedule a special meeting of the Executive Committee.

5. The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and Energy will be the lead agency, in close coordination with the Department of Education, in helping the Commission and the Executive Committee implement the Plan of Action.

6. This in effect t supersede:

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6. This Order shall take effect immediately, and shall remain in effect until such time legislation is adopted and signed which supersedes this Order.

#### **EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 112**

- I, JAMES J. FLORIO, Governor of the State of New Jersey, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and by the Statutes of this State, do hereby ORDER and DIRECT:
- 1. November 26, 1993, the day following Thanksgiving, shall be granted as a day off to employees who work in the Executive Departments of State Government and who are paid from State funds or from federal funds made available to the State, whose functions, in the opinion of their appointing authority, permit such absence.
- 2. An alternate day off shall be granted to the aforementioned category of employees whose functions, in the opinion of their appointing authority, preclude such absence on November 26, 1993.

- WHEREAS, The State of New Jersey's rural and urban communities are rich in a variety of natural resources; and
- WHEREAS, There is an increasing demand being placed upon these natural resources to support the State's citizenry; and
- Whereas, A clear awareness among the public of the frailty of these natural resources is necessary to protect the health and preserve the quality of life of the State's citizenry; and
- WHEREAS, It is essential to provide the State's citizenry with opportunities to acquire the knowledge, values, attitudes, commitment and skills needed to protect and enhance these aspects of our environment;

Now, Therefore, I, Thomas H. Kean, Governor of the State of New Jersey, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and statutes of this State, do hereby ORDER and DIRECT:

- 1. There is hereby created the Commission on Environmental Education which shall:
- a. identify specific information on the protection and enhancement of the environment which should be communicated to the State's citizenry;
- b. propose a plan of actions and programs, including educational initiatives, which should be undertaken to ensure that this information is communicated to the State's citizenry; and
- c. provide recommendations regarding measures that should be undertaken by individual and corporate citizens of New Jersey to conform behavior toward protection and enhancement of the environment.
  - 2. The Commission shall consist of 22 members including:
- a. two representatives from academia in the fields of environmental education and/or environmental science;
  - b. one representative of the clergy;
  - c. two representatives from labor/industry;
- d. two representatives from cultural institutions including, but not limited to, organizations such as museums and nature centers;

- e. three public or private school teachers, one from each of the following groupings—grades kindergarten to third, grades fourth to sixth, and grades seventh to twelfth;
  - f. one representative from school administration;
  - g. one representative from a local school board;
  - h. two representatives from non-partisan, public interest groups;
  - i. two representatives from the medical and/or health profession;
  - j. two non-academic science professionals;
  - k. two representatives from environmental education groups;
  - 1. the Commissioner of Education, or his designee; and
- m. the Commissioner of Environmental Protection, or his designee.
- 3. The Commission shall provide all individuals or organizations so inclined with the opportunity to provide written and/or oral testimony.
- 4. The Commission shall establish a work schedule and report its findings to the Governor no later than April 23, 1990.
  - 5. This Order shall take effect immediately. Issued April 24, 1989.

    - f. Support such other environmental education activities as the commission determines are appropriate;
    - g. Provide technical assistance to the Legislature for legislation related to environmental education; and
    - h. Submit an annual report on the status of environmental education to the Governor and the Legislature.
