### SENATE, No. 798

### STATE OF NEW JERSEY

### **INTRODUCED MARCH 10, 1994**

#### By Senators LITTELL and O'Connor

AN ACT expanding eligibility for certain veterans education benefits and amending P.L.1975, c.331.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. Section 1 of P.L.1975, c.331 (C.18A:71-61) is amended to read as follows:
  - 1. As used herein:

"Prisoner of war" and "person missing in action" means any person who was a resident of this State at the time he or she entered service of the United States Armed Forces, or whose official residence is within this State, and who, while serving in said United States Armed Forces, has been declared to be a prisoner of war, or to be a person missing in action as established by the Secretary of Defense after January 1, 1960.

"Dependent" means any child born before [or], during or after the period of time its parent was a prisoner of war or a person missing in action, or any child legally adopted or in the legal custody of the parent prior to [and], during or after the time the parent was a prisoner of war or a person missing in action.

(cf: P.L.1975, c.331, s.1)

2. This act shall take effect immediately.

### **STATEMENT**

This bill expands the definition of a dependent of a prisoner of war or a person missing in action eligible to receive a bachelor's degree free of tuition at any institution of higher learning on this State.

Under the bill, the dependent of a person who was a prisoner of war or a person missing in action would include a child born or adopted after his or her parent was a prisoner of war or a person missing in action.

Under current law, a dependent eligible for free tuition includes only a child born or adopted before or during the time the parent was a prisoner of war or a person missing in action.

Expands definition of dependent of POW or MIA eligible to receive a bachelor's degree tuition-free at any institution in State.

The Assembly Veterans, Military Affairs and Gaming Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 798.

This bill expands the definition of a dependent of a prisoner of war or a person missing in action eligible to receive a bachelor's degree free of tuition at any institution of higher learning in this State. Under the bill, the definition includes a child born or adopted after his or her parent was a prisoner of war or a person missing in action. Under current law, only a child born or adopted before or during the time the parent was a prisoner of war or a person missing in action is eligible for free tuition.

## STATE OF NEW JERSEY

The Senate Education Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 798.

This bill expands the definition of a dependent of a prisoner of war or a person missing in action, who is eligible to receive a bachelor's degree free of tuition at any institution of higher learning in the State, to include a child born or adopted after his or her parent was a prisoner of war or a person missing in action.

Under current law, a dependent eligible for free tuition includes only a child born or adopted before or during the time the parent was a prisoner of war or a person missing in action.

## SENATE, No. 798

### STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: SEPTEMBER 12, 1994

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 798.

Senate Bill No. 798 expands the definition of a dependent of a prisoner of war, or a person missing in action, to include a child born or adopted <u>after</u> his or her parent was a prisoner of war, or a person missing in action, for the purpose of making that dependent eligible for a tuition-free college education at any institution of higher learning in the State.

Under current law, a dependent eligible for a tuition-free college education includes only a child born or adopted before or during the time the parent was a prisoner of war or a person missing in action.

As reported, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 2055 of 1994.

### FISCAL IMPACT

This bill may result in future additional costs to institutions of higher education; however, the number of persons who would be eligible under this bill and the institutions which would incur the additional cost cannot be determined at this time.
