### INTRODUCED OCTOBER 15, 1992

AN ACT increasing the membership of the boards of taxation of certain counties and amending R.S.54:3-2.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. R.S.54:3-2 is amended to read as follows:

54:3-2. Each board shall, as heretofore, be known as the county board of taxation, and be composed of three members, except as hereinafter provided, to be appointed by the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. Each member shall be a resident and citizen of the county in and for which he is appointed. Members shall be chosen because of their special qualifications, knowledge and experience in matters concerning the valuation and taxation of property, particularly of real property. At no time shall more than two of the members belong to the same political party. In counties of the first class and in counties of the fifth class having a population of more than [500,000] 400,000 there shall be five members of whom no more than three shall belong to the same political party. For the purposes of this section, "population" means the <sup>1</sup>[most recent]<sup>1</sup> [official] State population [count of each county of this State as 22 reported by the New Jersey Department of Labor, 1 [estimates for each county, Population Estimates for New Jersey, issued by 23 24 Occupational and Demographic Research in the Division of Labor Market and Demographic Research of the New Jersey 25 26 Department of Labor] according to the 1990 federal decennial 27 census<sup>1</sup>. Each member shall, within 24 months of appointment, 28 unless the member shall have served as a member of the county 29 board of taxation continuously for at least 10 years prior to the effective date of P.L.1981, c.516, was reappointed to a five-year 30 31 term prior to that date, and is currently serving that term, 32 furnish proof that he has received certificates indicating satisfactory completion of training courses designated in section 33 4 of P.L.1967, c.44 (C.54:1-35.28) or that he possesses an 34 assessor's certificate issued pursuant to P.L.1967, c.44, as 35 supplemented. Each member serving on the effective date of 36 37 P.L.1979, c.499, unless the member shall have served as a 38 member continuously for at least 10 years prior to the effective date of P.L.1981, c.516, was reappointed to a five-year term 39 prior to that date, and is currently serving that term, shall 40 furnish such proof within 30 months of such effective date, if 30 41 42 months or more of his term are remaining thereafter.

EXPLANATION--Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law.

### S1266 [1R]

If any member so required does not furnish such proof within said 24-month period, or 30-month period for any member serving on the effective date of P.L.1979, c.499, the county tax administrator shall immediately notify the president of the county board of taxation and the Director of the Division of Taxation. The director shall upon the receipt of such notification declare the position to be vacant, and shall notify the Governor of the existence of such vacancy. The Governor shall thereupon appoint, with the advice and consent of the Senate, a different citizen and resident of the relative county to fill such position for the unexpired term.

#### **STATEMENT**

This bill increases from three to five the membership of county boards of taxation in counties of the fifth class with a population of over 400,000 persons.

Under current law, counties of the first class and counties of the fifth class with a population of more than 500,000 have boards of taxation comprised of five members. Boards of taxation in all other counties are comprised of three members. According to N.J.S.40A:6-1, counties of the first class are defined as having a population of more than 550,000 and a population density of more than 3,000 persons per square mile, and counties of the fifth class are defined as bordering on the Atlantic Ocean and having a population of more than 100,000.

An increase in the membership of boards of taxation in counties of the fifth class having a population of more than 400,000 persons is needed in order to better serve the public of those counties. A larger board will be able to hear appeals and render decisions in a more timely manner.

The Assembly Local Government Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 1266 (1R).

Senate Bill No. 1266 (1R) increases from three to five the membership of county boards of taxation in counties of the fifth class with a population of over 400,000 persons.

Under current law, counties of the first class and counties of the fifth class with a population of more than 500,000 have boards of taxation comprised of five members. Boards of taxation in all other counties are comprised of three members. According to N.J.S.40A:6-1, counties of the fifth class are defined as bordering on the Atlantic Ocean and having a population of more than 100,000. Under the 1990 census figures, the county tax board of Ocean County would experience an increase in membership pursuant to this bill.

Senate Bill No. 1266 (1R) is identical to Assembly Bill No. 1914, as amended by the committee on May 10, 1993.

The Senate Community Affairs Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 1266 with Senate committee amendments.

Senate Bill No. 1266, as amended by the committee, increases from three to five the membership of county boards of taxation in counties of the fifth class with a population of over 400,000 persons.

Under current law, counties of the first class and counties of the fifth class with a population of more than 500,000 have boards of taxation comprised of five members. Boards of taxation in all other counties are comprised of three members. According to N.J.S.40A:6-1, counties of the fifth class are defined as bordering on the Atlantic Ocean and having a population of more than 100,000. Under the 1990 census figures, the county tax board of Ocean County would experience an increase in membership pursuant to this bill.

The committee amended the bill to tie the population figure to the 1990 census rather than the publication of the New Jersey Department of Labor referenced in the bill, which was discontinued after 1989.
