## STATE OF NEW JERSEY

#### INTRODUCED FEBRUARY 13, 1992

#### By Senators BENNETT, PALAIA and Matheussen

AN ACT concerning the prevention, detection and treatment of breast cancer <sup>1</sup>[and] <sup>1</sup> supplementing <sup>2</sup>[Titles] <u>Title</u><sup>2</sup> 26 <sup>2</sup>[and 45]<sup>2</sup> of the Revised Statutes <sup>1</sup>and making an appropriation therefor <sup>1</sup>.

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BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. The Department of Health, in consultation with the <sup>2</sup>New Jersey Division of the<sup>2</sup> American Cancer Society<sup>2</sup>, the Radiological Society of New Jersey<sup>2</sup> and the <sup>2</sup>[State Board of Medical Examiners] American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, New Jersey Chapter<sup>2</sup>, shall prepare informational booklet <sup>1</sup>in English and Spanish <sup>1</sup> which describes, in a manner easily understandable by the patient, recognized dietary and lifestyle implications for the prevention of breast cancer, advantages and methods of early detection, and the risks and procedures involved with alternative methods of breast cancer treatment. The department shall make a supply of booklets available to all licensed health care facilities engaged in the diagnosis or treatment of breast cancer, facilities which provide mammography services and physicians engaged in the diagnosis or treatment of breast cancer<sup>1</sup>, and social services agencies that primarily serve women<sup>1</sup>.
- 2. An attending physician shall give all patients who are referred for a routine mammogram or who are under the physician's care for treatment of breast cancer a copy of the informational booklet on breast cancer prepared by the Department of Health pursuant to section 1 of P.L., c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill).

<sup>2</sup>[Upon receipt of the booklet, the patient shall sign a form which states that the patient has been given the booklet by the attending physician. The physician shall retain the form in the patient's medical record. AN ACT concerning the prevention, detection and treatment of
breast cancer and supplementing Titles 26 and 45 of the

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. The Department of Health, in consultation with the American Cancer Society and the State Board of Medical Examiners, shall prepare an informational booklet which describes, in a manner easily understandable by the patient, recognized dietary and lifestyle implications for the prevention of breast cancer, advantages and methods of early detection, and the risks and procedures involved with alternative methods of breast cancer treatment. The department shall make a supply of booklets available to all licensed health care facilities engaged in the diagnosis or treatment of breast cancer, facilities which provide mammography services and physicians engaged in the diagnosis or treatment of breast cancer.
- 2. An attending physician shall give all patients who are referred for a routine mammogram or who are under the physician's care for treatment of breast cancer a copy of the informational booklet on breast cancer prepared by the Department of Health pursuant to section 1 of P.L., c. (C.) (pending before the Legislature as this bill).

Upon receipt of the booklet, the patient shall sign a form which states that the patient has been given the booklet by the attending physician. The physician shall retain the form in the patient's medical record. In the case of a patient who may undergo a surgical procedure for treatment of breast cancer, the attending physician shall give the booklet to the patient and give the patient a reasonable opportunity to read it and ask questions in regard to its contents before the patient is asked to give written consent for the surgical procedure pursuant to P.L.1984, c.185 (C.45:9-22.2).

- 3. A physician who fails to comply with the provisions of section 2 of this act is subject to disciplinary action and civil penalties pursuant to sections 8, 9 and 12 of P.L.1978, c.73 (C.45:1-21, 22 and 25).

### STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: FEBRUARY 22, 1993

The Assembly Health and Human Services Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 363 (1R) with committee amendments.

As amended by the committee, this bill requires the Department of Health, in consultation with the New Jersey Division of the American Cancer Society, the Radiological Society of New Jersey and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, New Jersey Chapter, to prepare an informational booklet in English and Spanish summarizing recognized dietary and lifestyle implications for the prevention of breast cancer, advantages and methods of early detection, and the risks and procedures involved with alternative methods of breast cancer treatment. The amended bill directs the department to supply copies of the booklet to all licensed health care facilities, facilities which mammography services, physicians engaged in the diagnosis or treatment of breast cancer and social services agencies that primarily serve women.

The amended bill also requires all attending physicians to give the booklet to all patients under their care for breast cancer or who have been referred for a mammogram.

The bill appropriates \$35,000 to the Department of Health for the preparation of the booklet.

The committee amended the bill at the sponsor's request to:

- provide a consultative role for the Radiological Society of New Jersey and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, New Jersey Chapter, rather than the State Board of Medical Examiners, in the preparation of the booklet;
- delete the requirement that the patient sign a form acknowledging receipt of the booklet from the attending physician; that the physician retain the form in the patient's medical record; and that in the case of a patient who may undergo a surgical procedure for treatment of breast cancer, the attending physician give the booklet to the patient and provide a reasonable opportunity to read, and ask questions regarding its contents before asking the patient to give written consent for the procedure; and
- delete those provisions of the bill which would have subjected a physician who fails to comply with the requirements of the bill to disciplinary action and civil penalties, and instead provide a physician with immunity from civil liability because of a failure to give a patient a copy of the booklet.

According to a fiscal note to the bill prepared by the Office of Legislative Services, the Department of Health and the Office of Management and Budget have estimated that it would cost \$69,000, \$57,000 and \$57,000, respectively, in each of the next three fiscal years to print an estimated 400,000 breast cancer information booklets annually.

As reported by the committee, this bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 1264 Aca (Derman), which the committee also reported on this date.

The Senate Health and Human Services Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 363 with committee amendments.

As amended by committee, this bill requires the Department of Health, in consultation with the American Cancer Society and the State Board of Medical Examiners, to prepare an informational booklet in English and Spanish summarizing recognized dietary and lifestyle implications for the prevention of breast cancer, advantages and methods of early detection, and the risks and procedures involved with alternative methods of breast cancer treatment. The bill directs the department to supply copies of the booklet to all licensed health care facilities, facilities which provide mammography services, physicians engaged in the diagnosis or treatment of breast cancer and social services agencies that primarily serve women.

The bill also requires all attending physicians to give the booklet to all patients under their care for breast cancer or who have been referred for a mammogram. In the case of a patient who may undergo surgery for breast cancer, the attending physician is required to discuss any questions the patient may have about the contents of the booklet before she is asked to give written consent for the surgical procedure. In all cases, the patient is required to sign a form indicating that she received the booklet and the physician is directed to retain the signed form in the patient's medical record.

A physician who does not comply with the provisions of the bill is subject to disciplinary action and civil penalties pursuant to sections 8, 9 and 12 of P.L.1978, c.73 (C.45:1-21, 22 and 25).

The bill appropriates \$35,000 to the department for the preparation of the booklet.

The committee amended the bill to require that the booklet be prepared in English and Spanish and that it shall be distributed at social services agencies, as well as at health care facilities. The amendments also add the \$35,000 apppropriation.

# FISCAL NOTE TO SENATE, No. 363

## STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: July 7, 1992

Senate Bill No. 363 of 1992 requires the Department of Health (DOH), in consultation with the American Cancer Society and the State Board of Medical Examiners, to prepare an informational booklet summarizing recognized dietary and lifestyle implications for the prevention of breast cancer and the methods of breast cancer treatment. DOH will supply copies of the booklet to all health care facilities. facilities which mammography services and physicians engaged in the diagnosis or treatment of breast cancer. All attending physicians would be required to give the booklet to all patients under their care for breast cancer or who have been referred for a mammogram; attending physicians would be required to discuss any questions a patient may have about the contents of the booklet before the patient gives written consent for any surgical procedures. The physician would be required to have the patient sign a form indicating that she received the information; such form will be retained by the physician as part of the patient's record. Failure to comply with these provisions would subject a physician to disciplinary action and civil penalties.

The Department of Health and the Office of Management and Budget have estimated the cost of this legislation at \$69,000, \$57,000 and \$57,000, respectively, in each of the next three fiscal years to print an estimated 400,000 booklets annually.

The Office of Legislative Services concurs that the estimates are reasonable. However, OLS notes that information of a similar nature is currently made available to women by health care providers. It is further noted that enforcement costs of the State Board of Medical Examiners to assure that physicians comply with the bill's requirements are not known. Furthermore, affected physicians may increase their fees in order to comply with the various administrative requirements.

This fiscal note has been prepared pursuant to P.L.1980, c.67.
