P.L.1993, CHAPTER 309, approved December 23, 1993 1993 Assembly No. 2942

AN ACT concerning early intervention services, supplementing Title 26 of the Revised Statutes and repealing section 3 of P.L.1981, c.415.

 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. The Legislature finds and declares that:
- a. It is in the best interests of the State to provide a comprehensive system of early intervention services to support infants and toddlers with disabilities, those at risk for disability, and their families, that is built on existing social networks, and naturally occurring supports such as community associations and extended families which promote the inclusion of the child and the family within the community;
- b. Infants and toddlers with disabilities are uniquely dependent on their families for survival and nurturance, and while service systems and the personnel within those systems may fluctuate, a family is the only common thread in a child's life;
- c. There is an urgent need to enhance the development of infants and toddlers with disabilities to minimize their potential for developmental delay and to enhance the capacity for families to meet the needs of these infants and toddlers;
- d. There is also a need to reduce the education costs to our society, reduce costs associated with reliance on social services, minimize the likelihood of institutionalization, reduce health care costs and improve the long-term health and potential for future employability and independence of infants and toddlers with disabilities;
- e. No one agency or discipline can meet the complex needs of infants with disabilities and their families, and services to infants and toddlers with disabilities must be comprehensive and multi-disciplinary and must be coordinated so as to assure access and assist families in obtaining needed information and encouraging advocacy on their behalf; and
- f. Services and strategies to assist and support families must respect autonomy, interdependence and decision-making in a way which reflects the unique racial, ethnic, cultural and social-economic experiences and background of a family.
- 2. The Department of Hoslth, in conjunction with the Departments of Education and Human Services, shall establish a Statewide system of early intervention services for eligible infants and toddlers from birth to age two, inclusive, in accordance with Part H of the "Individuals with Disabilities Education Act," Pub. L. 91-230 (20 U.S.C. § 1471 et seq.).
- 3. The Department of Health, in consultation with the

Constituents of Education and Human Jervices, shell adopt rules and conflictions pursuant to the "Administrative Precedure Act."

STATEMENT

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This bill clarifies the legislative mandate for the Department of Floatils, in conjunction with the Departments of Education and Fluman Services, to create a Statewide system of coordinated, comprehensive, multidisciplinary interagency programs for the provision of early intervention services to eligible infants and toddless from birth to age three, and their families. The early intervention services are required under Part H of the federal findividuals with Disabilities Education Act," Pub.L.91-230 (20 U.S.C.\$1471 et seq.).

The fill repeals section 3 of P.L. 1981, c.415 (C.18A:46-6.2) which originally mandated the Department of Education to provide early intervention services to infants and toddlers with disabilities under three years of age. Section 3 was amended in 1092 (P.L. 1992, c.155), effective July 1, 1993, to transfer the responsibility for early intervention services from the Department of Education to the Department of Health; however, the allocation of the statute remained in Title 18A (Education) of the New Jersey Statutes. This bill repeals the statute in Title 18A and replaces it with similar statutory language, updated to reflect federal law, that would be allocated in Title 26 (Health) of the Revised Statutes.

Currently, approximately 2,780 infants and toddlers with disabilities receive early intervention services provided through the Department of Education. In Piscal Year 1993, the program is funded at a level of \$18.3 million (\$14.6 million State and \$3.5 million federal). This funding will be transferred to the Department of Health in Piscal Year 1994, and upon enactment into law of this bill, additional federal funds will be available to the State so that other eligible infants and toddlers will be able to receive needed early intervention services.

The Assembly Health and Human Services Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 2942.

This bill clarifies the legislative mandate for the Department of Health, in conjunction with the Departments of Education and Human Services, to create a Statewide system of coordinated, comprehensive, multidisciplinary interagency programs for the provision of early intervention services to eligible infants and toddlers from birth to age three, and their families.
