The Senate Judiciary Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate Bill No. 1348.

This bill would create an additional Superior Court judgeship to be assigned to Gloucester County. Gloucester County presently has eight assigned judgeships.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

The Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 1348 (1R).

Senate Bill No. 1348 (1R) provides for one additional Superior Court judge for Gloucester County. Gloucester County presently has by statute eight assigned judgeships.

N.J.S.2B:2-1 provides for a total of 402 judges in the Superior Court; this bill increases that total to 403 judges.

The Administrative Office of the Courts supports this bill.

FISCAL IMPACT

According to the Administrative Office of the Courts, this bill would cost the State an additional \$150,000 for the salary and fringe benefits of this judge. This bill does not contain an appropriation for this position.
