AN ACT concerning	special	registration	plates	and	supplementing
chapter 3 of Title	39 of th	ne Revised St	atues.		

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. a. Upon application of any person who is the holder of a Combat Infantryman Badge, as certified ¹[by the Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs] on the applicant's DD-214 form or on a Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty¹, the director shall issue, for the motor vehicle owned or leased by the person, distinctive plates bearing a design approved by the director in addition to the registration number and other markings or identification prescribed by law. The plates shall bear the words "Combat Infantryman Badge" and depict the Combat Infantryman Badge emblem. ¹[There shall be no cost to the applicant for these special plates other than] The fee for these plates shall be \$15 in addition to ¹ the fees otherwise prescribed by law for the registration of motor vehicles.

- b. The surviving spouse of a former holder of the Combat Infantryman Badge who is eligible to operate a motor vehicle in this State under the provisions of R.S.39:3-10 may retain the special license plates obtained by the deceased spouse pursuant to this section for display on a motor vehicle registered to the surviving spouse under the provisions of R.S.39:3-4.
- c. The director shall promulgate rules and regulations governing the issuance and use of these registration plates.
- 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the fifth month after enactment.

Provides special registration plates for Combat Infantryman Badge recipients.

This bill permits holders of the Combat Infantryman Badge medal to obtain special license plates for their motor vehicles. The surviving spouse of a former holder of the Combat Infantryman Badge who is eligible to operate a motor vehicle in this State would be permitted to retain the special license plates obtained by the deceased spouse.

The bill also requires the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles to promulgate rules for the issuance and use of the plates.

The Assembly Veterans and Military Affairs Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 705 [1R].

This bill permits holders of the Combat Infantryman Badge, or "CIB," to obtain special license plates for their motor vehicles. The holder of a CIB must certify that fact by the presentation of a DD-214 form or a Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty in order to receive the special plate. The bill also requires that a \$15 fee be charged to obtain these special license plates, which is the same fee charged to obtain other special plates.

The surviving spouse of a former holder of the Combat Infantryman Badge who is eligible to operate a motor vehicle in this State would be permitted to retain the special license plates obtained by the deceased spouse.

The Combat Infantryman Badge is an important award for heroism given only to Army personnel below the grade of colonel who have satisfactorily performed their duty while assigned or attached to an infantry brigade, regiment, battalion, company or smaller-size unit during any period such unit was engaged in active ground combat. Artillerymen, forward observers, armored cavalry reconnaissance troops, tank crewmen, military police and combat engineers are not qualified for the award. CIB-eligible military actions include World War II, the Korean Conflict, the Vietnam Conflict, the Dominican Republic, the Korean DMZ, Grenada, Panama and Desert Storm.

The Senate Senior Citizens, Veterans Affairs and Agriculture Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 705 with committee amendments.

This bill, as amended, permits holders of the Combat Infantryman Badge medal to obtain special license plates for their motor vehicles. The surviving spouse of a former holder of the Combat Infantryman Badge who is eligible to operate a motor vehicle in this State would be permitted to retain the special license plates obtained by the deceased spouse.

The Combat Infantryman Badge, or "CIB," is an important award for heroism given only to Army personnel below the grade of colonel who have satisfactorily performed their duty while assigned or attached to an infantry brigade, regiment, battalion, company or smaller-size unit during any period such unit was engaged in active ground combat. Artillerymen, forward observers, armored cavalry recon troops, tank crewmen, military police and combat engineers are not qualified for the award. CIB-eligible military actions include World War II, the Korean Conflict, the Vietnam Conflict, the Dominican Republic, the Korean DMZ, Grenada, Panama and Desert Storm.

The committee amended the bill to provide that a holder of a CIB could certify that fact by the presentation of a DD-214 form or a Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty. The bill originally required the Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs to certify the applicant's eligibility for the special license plates. This amendment was suggested by the Department of Military and Veterans' Affairs.

The committee also amended the bill to require that a \$15 fee be charged to obtain these special license plates. This is the same fee that is charged, for example, to obtain a special license plate as a disabled veteran. This amendment was suggested by the Division of Motor Vehicles in the Department of Law and Public Safety.
