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1 AN ACT concerning immunity for certain emergency personnel
2 and amending P.L.1987, c.116.

4 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the
5 State of New Jersey:

6 1. Section 7 of P.L.1987, c.116 (C.30:4-27.7) is amended to
7 read as follows:

8 7. a. A law enforcement officer, screening service or
9 short-term care facility designated staff person or their
10 respective employers, acting in good faith pursuant to this act
11 who takes reasonable steps to assess, take custody of, detain or
12 transport an individual for the purposes of mental health
13 assessment or treatment is immune from civil and criminal
14 liability.

15 b. An emergency services or medical transport person or their
16 respective employers, acting in good faith pursuant to this act
17 and pursuant to the direction of a person designated in subsection
18 a. of this section, who takes reasonable steps to take custody of,
19 detain or transport an individual for the purpose of mental health
20 assessment or treatment is immune from civil and criminal
21 liability.

22 For the purposes of this subsection, "emergency services or
23 medical transport person" means a member of a first aid,
24 ambulance, rescue squad or fire department, whether paid or
25 volunteer, auxiliary police officer or paramedic.

27 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

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30 STATEMENT

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32 This bill extends the immunity from civil and criminal liability
33 under P.L.1987, c.116, the law concerning involuntary civil
34 commitment, to certain emergency services or medical transport
35 persons and their respective employers who provide assistance to
36 law enforcement officers or screening service or short-term care
37 facility designated staff persons in taking custody of, detaining or
38 transporting an individual for the purposes of mental health
39 assessment or treatment.

40 The bill defines "emergency services or medical transport
41 person" as a member of a first aid, ambulance, rescue squad or
42 fire department, whether paid or volunteer, auxiliary police
43 officer or paramedic.

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48 Provides immunity from liability under civil commitment law to
49 certain emergency services or medical transport persons.

The Assembly Insurance Committee reports favorably, Senate Bill No. 424.

This bill extends to emergency and medical transport personnel the immunity from civil and criminal liability already provided under P.L.1987, c.116, the law concerning involuntary civil commitment, to law enforcement officers, screening services and staff of short-term care facilities who act in good faith to assess, take custody of, detain or transport a person for the purposes of mental health assessment or treatment.
