## P.L.1992, CHAPTER 155, approved November 25, 1992 1992 Senate No. 1151

AN ACT concerning programs for certain pre-school children and amending P.L.1981, c.415.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1 Section 3 of P.L.1981, c.415 (C.18A:46-6.2) is amended to read as follows:

3. The Department of [Education] Health in conjunction with the Departments of [Health] Education and Human Services shall provide, within the limits of funds appropriated to the Department of [Education] Health for these purposes, suitable programs for children below the age of 3 to prepare such children for the programs to be provided [after] at age 3 pursuant to N.J.S.18A:48-13. Such services shall be provided according to rule; promulgated by the [commissioner] Commissioner of Health after consultation with the Departments of [Health] Education and Human Services [and with the approval of the State Board].

2. This act shall take effect on July 1, 1993.

## STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: NOVEMBER 9, 1992

The Assembly Health and Human Services Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 1151.

This bill amends section 1 of P.L.1981, c.415 (C.18A:46-6.2) to make the Department of Health (DOH) responsible for the provision of programs necessary to prepare handicapped infants for pre-school educational programs starting at the age of three, and to fund these programs through DOH, beginning in FY1994. Currently, these programs are within the Department of Education and serve children who are classified as: mentally retarded, but not so eligible for day training pursuant to severely as to be N.J.S.18A:46-9; orthopedically handicapped; communication handicapped; visually handicapped; neurologically or perceptually impaired; chronically ill; emotionally disturbed; maladjusted, auditorily handicapped; autistic; or pre-school handicapped. The annual appropriations act for FY1993 (P.L.1992, c.40) includes \$14,771,000 for these programs.

This bill is identical to Assembly Bill No. 1816 (Rocco/Charles), which is currently pending before the Assembly.
