BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The Assembly Senior Citizens Committee favorably reports an Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill Nos. 2905, 3057, 3140, 438, 1241, 3003, 2531, 1206, 2589 and 3196.

This substitute raises the annual income eligibility requirements for the "Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled" program (PAAD). Under current law, the annual income eligibility requirements are \$13,650 for single individuals and \$16,750 for married couples. These requirements would be raised to \$14,900 and \$18,250 for single and married persons, respectively, to reflect the 4.0% cost-of-living increase in Social Security benefits for 1989 and the 4.7% cost-of-living increase in Social Security benefits for 1990.

The substitute also establishes an automatic cost-of-living increase in the income eligibility limits that is tied to the annual cost-of-living increase in the Social Security program. The increase shall be made within three months of the determination of the Social Security cost-of-living increase and no person who is eligible shall be made ineligible for benefits because of the Social Security cost-of-living increase. The Commissioner of Human Services shall establish the program's income eligibility limits annually by regulation for single and married persons, respectively.

The substitute is retroactive to January 1, 1990.

The Assembly Appropriations Committee reports favorably Assembly Nos. 2905, 3057, 3140, 438, 1241, 3003, 2531, 1206, 2589 and 3196 ACS with committee amendments.

Assembly Bill Nos. 2905, 3057, 3140, 438, 1241, 3003, 2531, 1206, 2589 and 3196 ACS, as amended, increases the annual income eligibility requirements for the "Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled" (PAAD) program. Under current law, the annual income eligibility requirements are \$13,650 for single individuals and \$16,750 for married couples. This bill raises these requirements to \$15,700 and \$19,250 respectively, to reflect the 4.0% cost-of-living increase in Social Security benefits for 1989, the 4.7% increase in benefits for 1990 and the 5.4% increase for 1991.

The bill as amended is retroactive to January 1, 1991.

FISCAL IMPACT

This bill contains no appropriation. Moneys to fund the increased costs will come from the Casino Revenue Fund. In a fiscal note prepared for this bill prior to these amendments, the Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimated that annual costs of the proposed changes may range from \$12 million to over \$34 million; OLS noted that varying cost estimates prepared by Department of Human Services (DHS) and the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) are reasonable, but that the actual costs could be even higher.

DHS estimated the annual cost for PAAD, Lifeline, and Hearing Aid Assistance at \$14.6 million in the first year, \$19.2 million in the second year and \$24.6 million in the third year. Administrative costs were estimated at \$1,008,467, \$1.3 million and \$1.7 million in the three years. This yields total costs of \$15,622,233, \$20,511,285 and \$26,333,629 in the first through third years. OMB disputed DHS' second and third year cost estimates and has estimated costs of approximately \$16.1 million and \$18.0 million, respectively. OLS noted that costs could range from \$12 million, based on the size of the PAAD enrollment decline since the last income level change in 1987, to over \$34 million, based on national income data and State data on the population over 65 years of age.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

The committee amended the bill to reflect the latest cost-of-living increase in Social Security benefits for January, 1991 at 5.4%. This increases the eligibility limits in the bill for singles from \$14,900 to \$15,700 and from \$18,250 to \$19,250 for married couples; the automatic cost-of-living increase provision was deleted; and the bill was made retroactive to January 1, 1991, the date of the latest Social Security cost-of-living increase, as calculated in the new income limits.

Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Nos. 2905, 3057, 3140, 438, 1241, 3003, 2531, 1206, 2589, and 3196 of 1990 increases the income limits for the Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled (PAAD) program to \$14,900 for single persons and \$18,200 for married persons and provides for an automatic cost-of-living increase in the income eligibility limits that is equal to the annual Social Security cost-of-living increase.

The Department of Human Services has estimated the annual cost of the Assembly Committee Substitute as follows:

The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) does not agree with the department's 2nd and 3rd year cost estimates and has estimated 2nd and 3rd year costs of approximately \$16.1 million and \$18.0 million, respectively.

The Office of Legislative Services concurs that both the department's and OMB's estimates are reasonable. However, as there is considerable uncertainty regarding the number of elderly and disabled persons who may qualify for the various programs due to the higher income limits, costs may be significantly higher or lower than estimated. For example, since the last increase in the PAAD income limits in FY 1987, PAAD enrollment has decreased from approximately 237,000 (FY 1987 avg.) to 223,000 (FY 1990 avg.). Assuming that most of the 14,000 person reduction in enrollment is attributable to increases in income due to the annual Social Security cost-of-living adjustment, it would cost approximately \$12 million to provide PAAD and other benefits to the 14,000 persons who may have been terminated from the program, plus some amount to provide benefits to an unknown number of persons who may now qualify for PAAD and other programs due to the PAAD's higher income limits. In

contrast, by applying national income data for the population over 65 years of age against the 1,009,000 persons over age 65 in the State, upwards of 37.000 elderly and 3,000 disabled persons may have incomes which would qualify them for PAAD and related programs, at a cost of approximately \$34.4 million. Thus, annual costs may range from \$12 million to over \$34 million and the department's and OMB's estimates are reasonable estimates of potential costs.

GOVERNOR FLORIO SIGNS BILL LIFTING LID ON PAAD PROGRAM

LINDEN - Nearly 37,000 additional senior and disabled citizens will be eligible for pharmaceutical assistance under legislation signed by Governor Jim Florio today to expand the program's income eligibility cap.

"I'm proud to be here today to give proof that we care about our people," said Governor Florio, as he signed a bill expanding the Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled (PAAD) program. "Without this program, the expensive medicines these people need would be out of reach. And that would be unacceptable to them and to the rest of us who care about them."

The Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged and Disabled Program was enacted in 1978 and currently enables 204,000 seniors and disabled citizens to buy prescriptions for only \$2. The bill, A 2905 sponsored by Assemblyman Fred Scerni and Assemblywoman Stephanie Bush, would expand PAAD eligibility from \$13,650 to \$15,700 for an individual and from \$16,750 to \$19,250 for married couples. The law will be retroactive to January 1, 1991 and is expected to enroll an additional 36,304 people in the PAAD program.

Funds for the program are derived from the Casino Revenue Fund, which provides resources for 29 programs for the elderly and disabled. These include pharmaceutical assistance and lifeline group homes, home health services, expansion of health care for the near poor and others.

"We put income limits on the program because that's fair. But with recent increases in Social Security benefits, some of the people we want to help are being pushed out of the program. That's not fair," said Governor Florio. "People sometimes ask me where the money from the Casino Fund goes. It always feels good to smile and tell them about the pharmaceutical assistance program. It represents the smartest investment we could make with this money because it maintains a quality of life for a special group of New Jersey citizens. But more than an investment, it's a commitment and it's one that I intend to keep."
