5 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey: 6

1. Section 16 of P.L.1990, c.52 (C.18A:7D-18) is amended to read as follows:

16. Each district's State aid for transportation shall equal the 9 sum of A1, A2 and A3 determined as follows: 10

DATED: SEPTEMBER 13, 1990

The Assembly Education Committee favorably reports Assembly, No. 3786 as amended.

As amended, this bill amends the "Quality Education Act of 1990," P.L.1990, c.52, to clarify the manner in which State aid payments for certain nonpublic school students are to be determined.

The bill provides that the State transportation aid paid to a school district for the transportation of a nonpublic school pupil shall not exceed the maximum amount that the district may expend to transport that pupil pursuant to N.J.S.18A:39-1. The bill also provides that State aid for compensatory education services for nonpublic school pupils shall continue in the same manner as obtained prior to the enactment of the "Quality Education Act of 1990." The amount of State aid per pupil for nonpublic school compensatory education shall equal the per pupil at-risk aid provided for public school pupils.

The bill also amends P.L.1977, c.193 to clarify which speech correction services a nonpublic school pupil may receive.

The New Jersey Catholic Conference, the Department of Education, New Jersey Association of School Administrators, and New Jersey Principals and Supervisors Association expressed support for the bill as amended.

The committee amendments shift the funding of supplementary instruction services for handicapped nonpublic school pupils from P.L.1977, c.192 (C.18A:46A-1 et seq.) to P.L.1977, c.193 (C.18A:46-19.1). The latter statute concerns services for classified pupils, while the former does not. The committee amendments also correct technical errors in section 6 of P.L.1977, c.193 (C.18A:46-19.4).

The Assembly Appropriations Committee reports favorably Assembly Bill No. 3786 [1R] with committee amendments.

Assembly Bill No. 3786 [1R], as amended, modifies the "Quality Education Act of 1990," P.L.1990, c.52, regarding State aid payments for nonpublic school students as follows:

1. Auxiliary compensatory aid for nonpublic school pupils shall continue in substantially the same manner as obtained prior to the enactment of the "Quality Education Act of 1990"(QEA). The amount of State aid per nonpublic school pupil shall equal the per pupil amounts of compensatory education in the pre-budget year plus the percentage increase in per capita income pursuant to section 3 of P.L.1990, c.52.

2. The speech correction services aid available to nonpublic school pupils pursuant to P.L.1977, c.193 will be based upon the State foundation aid in QEA, times the appropriate cost factor in QEA. Currently the costs are estimated by the district.

3. Transportation aid paid to a school district for the transportation of a nonpublic school pupil shall not exceed the maximum amount that the district may expend to transport that pupil pursuant to N.J.S.18A:39-1.

4. The funding of supplementary instruction services for handicapped nonpublic school pupils is shifted from P.L.1977, c.192 (C.18A:46A-1 et seq.), which concerns compensatory education aid, to P.L.1977, c.193 (C.18A:46-19.1), which concerns handicapped aid.

5. Certain technical errors in section 6 of P.L.1977, c.193 (C.18A:46-19.4) are corrected.

FISCAL IMPACT

A fiscal note has not been completed on this bill at this time. The change in auxiliary compensatory aid is expected to represent an increase in cost over what would otherwise occur under the "Quality Education Act of 1990," P.L.1990, c.52, and is estimated to be approximately \$17.4 million, or \$1.2 million more than the \$16.2 million appropriated in fiscal year 1991. The remainder of the bill is estimated to add approximately \$9.6 million more to the current fiscal year cost of \$10.3 million. This additional cost may be reduced by shifting pupil count to the pre-budget year.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS:

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The amendments change the calculation for auxiliary compensatory aid so that the nonpublic school per pupil aid will equal the amount of the previous year plus the percentage increase in per capita income. Additionally, language changes amend section 4 concerning certified speech-language specialists, as requested by the DOE.

with Senate committee amendments

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: MARCH 11, 1991

The Senate Education Committee favorably reports this bill with committee amendments.

As amended, this bill amends the "Quality Education Act of 1990," P.L.1990, c.52, to clarify the manner in which State aid payments for certain nonpublic school students are to be determined.

The bill provides that the State transportation aid paid to a school district for the transportation of a nonpublic school pupil shall not exceed the maximum amount that the district may expend to transport that pupil pursuant to N.J.S.18A:39–1. The bill also provides that State aid for compensatory education services for nonpublic school pupils shall continue in the same manner as obtained prior to the enactment of the "Quality Education Act of 1990." However, the amount of State aid per nonpublic school pupil shall be determined by multiplying the per pupil amounts of compensatory education for each service received in the pre-budget year by the percentage increase in per capita income pursuant to section 3 of P.L.1990, c.52. That amount shall then be multiplied by the number of services received by pupils who were identified as eligible to receive compensatory education in the prebudget year.

Aid available for speech correction services for nonpublic school pupils pursuant to P.L.1977, c.193 will be based upon the State foundation amount in QEA, times the appropriate cost factor in QEA. This will then be multiplied by the number of pupils who were identified as eligible to receive these services in the prebudget year. Currently the costs are estimated by the district.

In addition, the bill shifts the funding of supplementary instruction services for handicapped nonpublic school pupils from P.L.1977, c.192 (C.18A:46A-1 et seq.), which concerns compensatory education aid, to P.L.1977, c.193 (C.18A:46-19.1), which concerns handicapped aid.

The committee amendments provide that to determine the total aid for both compensatory education aid and auxiliary services aid, the appropriate per pupil cost shall be multiplied by the number of pupils eligible to receive services in the prebudget year. The amendments also provide that compensatory education aid will be paid for each service received per pupil, establish a cost factor for home instruction for nonpublic school pupils at 0.0037, and clarify the definition of auxiliary services.

[FIRST REPRINT] ASSEMBLY, No. 3786 STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: February 21, 1991

Assembly Bill No. 3786 (1R) of 1990 provides that the State transportation aid paid to a school district for the transportation of a nonpublic school pupil shall not exceed the maximum amount that the district may expend to transport that pupil pursuant to N.J.S.18A:39-1. The bill also provides that State aid for compensatory education services for nonpublic school pupils shall continue in the same manner as obtained prior to the enactment of the "Quality Education Act of 1990." The amount of State aid per pupil for nonpublic school compensatory education shall equal the per pupil at-risk aid provided for public school pupils.

The bill also amends P.L.1977, c.193 to clarify which speech correction services a nonpublic school pupil may receive.

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) estimates the approximate cost of this bill as \$30,000,000 in FY 1992. Of these costs, \$20.3 million represents an increase in State aid for nonpublic school compensatory education pupils and \$9.6 million represents additional costs for State aid for nonpublic school handicapped pupils.

The estimate for nonpublic school compensatory education is based upon data received from the Department of Education which indicates that 25,861 pupils will be eligible for compensatory education services in FY 1992. The bill provides that this aid will be calculated utilizing the appropriate "at-risk" factor in the Quality Education Act of 1990 (P.L.1990, c.53) multiplied by the State foundation amount as defined in that act. The factors are: .18 for grades preK-5; .20 for grades 6 through 8; and, .24 for grades 9 through 12. The State foundation amount is \$6835. In the absense of enrollment data by grade level, and using an average "at risk" cost of \$1412.57, nonpublic compensatory education aid in FY 1992 is estimated at \$36,530,000, or \$1412.57 x 25,861. The appropriation for this program in the current fiscal year is \$16,200,000.

The estimate for State aid for nonpublic handicapped pupils is based upon program data from the Governor's FY 1991 budget request, which indicates that 16,200 pupils received these services in FY 1990. If it is assumed that the appropriate cost factor for these services is the factor for supplementary and speech instruction, or .18, and that all pupils receive the same services, this program would cost \$19,930,860, or \$6835 x .18 x 16,200, in FY 1992. The appropriation for this program in the current fiscal year is \$10,279,000. 1 -

OLS notes, however, that the language in the bill regarding the appropriate cost factor to be used in calculating aid for nonpublic handicapped pupils is not entirely clear, and that costs could vary considerably based upon which factor is actually utilized.

OLS further notes that the section in the bill regarding transportation for nonpublic school pupils should not have any additional fiscal impact. This would only be affected if an increase in enrollment resulted in the need for additional transportation.

This legislative fiscal estimate has been produced by the Office of Legislative Services due to the failure of the Executive Branch to respond to our request for a fiscal note.

S 3127/A 4245; Sponsored by Senator O'Connor/Assemblymen Charles and Otlowski

This bill appropriates \$6 million from the "Petroleum Overcharge Reimbursement Fund" for energy assistance to certain low income households.

A 3786/S 3305; Sponsored by Assemblymen Cimino and Salmon/Senator Paterniti

This bill provides state funding for compensatory services for certain nonpublic schools and serves as a companion bill to the Quality Education Act.

In signing the bill, the Governor said: "It is particularly important that children who need special services have access to those services. This legislation will ensure that children in non-public schools get the services they need."

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
