By Assemblymen McGREEVEY, JACOBSON, Roma and Cohen

AN ACT creating the New Jersey Commission on Holocaust 1 2 Education ¹[, and making an appropriation]¹. 3 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the 4 5 State of New Jersey: 6 1. The Legislature finds and declares that: 7 a. During the period from 1933 to 1945, six million Jews and 8 millions of other Europeans were murdered in Nazi concentration camps as part of a carefully orchestrated program of cultural, 9 social and political genocide known as the Holocaust; 10 h. All people should remember the horrible atrocities 11 committed at that time and other times in human history as the 12 13 result of bigotry and tyranny and, therefore, should continually rededicate themselves to the principles of human rights and equal 14 protection under the laws of a democratic society; 15 c. It is desirable to educate our citizens about the events 16 leading up to the Holocaust and about the organizations and 17 facilities that were created and used purposefully for the 18 systematic destruction of human beings; 19 20d. It is the policy of the State of New Jersey that Holocaust 21 history is the proper concern of all people, particularly students enrolled in the schools of the State of New Jersey; 22 23 e. The New Jersey Department of Education, in conjunction with the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, the New 24 Jersey Education Association, and the New Jersey Council for 25 26 Social Studies, has developed a curriculum, entitled "The 27 Holocaust and Genocide: A Search for Conscience," which has 28 been implemented in courses of study on a trial basis in Vineland 29 and Teaneck and, subsequently, in other communities; 30 f. Programs, workshops, institutes, seminars, and other teacher-training activities for the study of the Holocaust have 31 32 taken place during recent years at various high schools and colleges in the State of New Jersey; and 33 34 g. It is desirable to create a State-level commission, which as 35 an organized body, on a continuous basis, will survey, design, encourage, and promote implementation of Holocaust education 36 and awareness programs in New Jersey and shall be responsible 37

3 2. a. The New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education is 4 created and established in the Executive Branch of the State 5 Government. For the purposes of complying with the provisions of Article V, Section IV, paragraph 1 of the New Jersey 6 7 Constitution, the commission is allocated within the Department of ¹[State] Education¹, but notwithstanding this allocation, the 8 9 commission shall be independent of any supervision or control by 10 the department or any board or officer thereof.

11 The commission shall consist of 21 members, including the 12 ¹[Secretary of State, the]¹ Commissioner of Education and the 13 Chancellor of Higher Education, serving ex officio, and ¹[18] <u>19</u>¹ 14 public members.

Public members shall be appointed as follows: three public 15 members shall be appointed by the President of the Senate; three 16 17 public members shall be appointed by the Speaker of the General 18 Assembly; and ¹[12] 13¹ public members shall be appointed by the 19 Governor, no less than six of whom shall at the time of their 20 appointment be members of the New Jersey Advisory Council on Holocaust Education, created pursuant to Executive Order No. 17 21 of 1982 and continued pursuant to Executive Order No. 87 of 1984 22 23 ¹[and],¹ Executive Order No. 168 of 1987 ¹and Executive Order No. 225 of 1990, and further continued pursuant to Executive 24 25 Order No. 14 of 1990¹. The public members shall be residents of 26 this State, chosen with due regard to broad geographic 27 representation and ethnic diversity, who have served prominently as spokespersons for, or as leaders of organizations which serve, 28 members of religious, ethnic, national heritage or social groups 29 which were subjected to genocide, torture, wrongful deprivation 30 of liberty or property, officially imposed or sanctioned violence, 31 32 and other forms of human rights violations and persecution at the 33 hands of the Nazis and their collaborators during the Nazi era, or they shall be residents who are experienced in the field of 34 35 Holocaust education.

b. Each public member of the commission shall serve for a 36 37 term of three years, except that of the initial members so appointed: one member appointed by the President of the Senate, 38 one member appointed by the Speaker of the General Assembly, 39 and four members appointed by the Governor shall serve for 40 terms of one year; one member appointed by the President of the 41 Senate, one member appointed by the Speaker of the General 42 43 Assembly, and four members appointed by the Governor shall serve for terms of two years; and one member appointed by the 44 President of the Senate, one member appointed by the Speaker of 45 the General Assembly, and ¹[four] <u>five¹</u> members appointed by 46 the Governor shall serve for terms of three years. 47 Public members shall be eligible for reappointment. They shall serve 48 49 until their successors are appointed and qualified, and the term of the successor of any incumbent shall be calculated from the 50

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expiration of the term of that incumbent. A vacancy occurring
 other than by expiration of term shall be filled in the same
 manner as the original appointment but for the unexpired term
 only.

5 c. The members of the commission shall serve without 6 compensation, but they shall be entitled to reimbursement for all 7 necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

8 d. The commission shall annually elect a chairman from among 9 its members. It shall meet upon the call of the chairman or of a 10 majority of the commission members. The presence of a majority 11 of the authorized membership of the commission shall be required 12 for the conduct of official business.

e. The commission shall appoint an executive director, who
shall serve at its pleasure and shall be a person qualified by
training and experience to perform the duties of the office.

16 3. The commission shall have the following responsibilities and17 duties:

a. To provide, based upon the collective knowledge and
experience of its members, assistance and advice to the public
and private schools with respect to the implementation of
Holocaust education and awareness programs ;

b. To meet with county and local school officials and other
interested public and private organizations, including service
organizations, for the purpose of assisting with the planning,
coordination or modification of courses of study dealing with the
subject of the Holocaust;

To survey and catalog the extent and breadth of Holocaust and genocide education presently being incorporated into the 28 29 curricula and taught in the school systems of the State, to 30 inventory those Holocaust memorials, exhibits and resources 31 which could be incorporated in courses of study at various 32 locations throughout the State, and, upon request, to assist the 33 State Department of Education and other educational agencies in the development and implementation of Holocaust and genocide 34 35 education programs. In furtherance of this responsibility, the 36 commission shall be authorized to contact and cooperate with existing Holocaust and genocide public or private nonprofit 37 38 resource organizations and may act as a liaison concerning Holocaust and genocide education to members of the United 39 States Senate and House of Representatives and the New Jersey 40 41 Senate and General Assembly;

The Assembly Education Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 986 as amended.

As amended, this bill establishes the New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education as a permanent statutory body established in, but not of, the Department of Education. At present, the New Jersey Advisory Council on Holocaust Education exists by authority of a series of executive orders that provide for its continuance through June, 1991.

The duties of the commission include giving assistance and advice to public and private schools concerning the implementation of Holocaust education and awareness programs in New Jersey schools; meeting with local school officials and other interested parties to assist with the planning, coordination or modification of Holocaust study programs; preparing a catalog of Holocaust and genocide education curricula in the State's schools; compiling a roster of experienced and knowledgeable volunteers willing to participate in Holocaust education and awareness programs; coordinating events memorializing the Holocaust; and reporting to the Governor and Legislature its findings and recommendations to facilitate the inclusion of Holocaust studies and special programs memorializing the Holocaust in educational systems in the State.

The bill provides that the commission shall consist of 21 members, including the Commissioner of Education and the Chancellor of Higher Education as ex officio members and 19 public members. Three of the public members are to be appointed by the President of the Senate, three are to be appointed by the Speaker of the General Assembly, and 13 are to be appointed by the Governor. Of the Governor's first appointments, no less than six shall at the time of appointment be members of the aforementioned New Jersey Advisory Council on Holocaust Education. After the initial appointments, public members are to be appointed to staggered terms of three years each.

In addition, the bill stipulates that the commission shall appoint an executive director.

The committee amendments transfer the commission from the Department of State to the Department of Education, and remove the Secretary of State from the commission, replacing him by an additional public member. The amendments also clarify the Executive Order under which the commission is currently operating.

The committee also amended the bill so that it will take effect on July 1, 1991 when the current council will expire, and deleted the appropriation, since the council is funded through June 1991.

Representatives of the Governor's Advisory Council on Holocaust Education, the Department of Education, a member of the State Board of Education and members of the public testified in favor of the bill. A member of the public testified in opposition to the bill.

This bill was prefiled for introduction in the 1990 session pending technical review. As amended the bill includes the changes required by technical review which has been performed.

Assembly Bill No. 986 (1R) of 1990 establishes the New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education as a permanent statutory body established in, but not of, the Department of Education. At present, the New Jersey Advisory Council on Holocaust Education exists by authority of a series of executive orders that provide for its continuance through June, 1991.

The duties of the commission include giving assistance and advice to public and private schools concerning the implementation of Holocaust education and awareness programs in New Jersey schools; meeting with local school officials and other interested parties to assist with the planning, coordination or modification of Holocaust study programs; preparing a catalog of Holocaust and genocide education curricula in the State's schools; compiling a roster of experienced and knowledgeable volunteers willing to participate in Holocaust education and awareness programs; coordinating events memorializing the Holocaust; and reporting to the Governor and Legislature its findings and recommendations to facilitate the inclusion of Holocaust studies and special programs memorializing the Holocaust in educational systems in the State. The commission is directed to appoint an executive director who shall serve at the pleasure of the commission and may call upon any public agency to provide information or staff support which may be necessary for it to carry out its mandated responsibilities.

The Office of Legislative Services notes that the Advisory Council on Holocaust Education, which currently performs the same duties as the proposed commission and is located within the Department of Education, expended \$80,000 and \$103,000 during Fiscal Years 1989 and 1990 respectively. As of June 4, 1991, the council had expended \$83,043 and is expected to spend about \$91,000 by the end of FY 1991. Of this amount, approximately \$25,000 is currently spent for the part time services of a paid consultant to assist the council in planning and coordinating its activities. An additional \$55,000 has been spent on grant awards and educational programs conducted by the commission, and the remaining portion was allocated for administrative expenses. The council is recommended to receive \$125,000 in FY 1992 to conduct operations.

The Office of Legislative Services notes that based upon the council's historical spending record, its FY 1992 recommended appropriation of \$125,000 would allow the commission to maintain its \$55,000 expenditure level for grant awards and educational

programs as well as provide for a full-time executive director to replace the part-time consultant at a salary of about \$40,000. A secretary earning approximately \$18,000 could also be hired. However, the OLS notes that the commission is permitted to call upon State and local agencies to provide information or staff support which may be necessary for it to carry out its mandated responsibilities. If the commission chooses to acquire its secretarial services in this manner, it would be able to shift this funding to other program areas and provide for additional grant awards and educational programs.

GOVERNOR FLORIO SIGNS BILL TO CREATE PERMANENT COMMISSION ON HOLOCAUST EDUCATION

LAWRENCEVILLE -- Governor Jim Florio today signed a bill which will help New Jersey's schoolchildren learn about the Holocaust. The new law would make the State Commission on Holocaust Education, which currently exists by authority of an Executive Order signed in 1982, a permanent part of the Department of Education.

"Remembering the Holocaust is not simply an individual's responsibility. It's a community's duty. Every community," said Governor Florio.

In his remarks to an audience of teachers who had just completed one of the Commission's training sessions on the Holocaust at Rider College, the Governor said, "You will do more than just teach your students about a terrible moment in history. You are going to help them pass on values about tolerance and humanity."

"Unfortunately, education is not enough," he said. In recent months we've seen a rise in anti-semitic and racist incidents. The Klu Klux Klan has reared its ugly head in New Jersey. Our response to such bigotry must be clear and strong. We won't accept it. It has no place in New Jersey."

Under this bill the Commission will be given the responsibility to assist and advise the Commissioner of Education on the implementation of Holocaust education in the State's public and private schools. Commission members will meet with local and county school officials and other interested parties to assist with planning, coordinating or modifying courses of study dealing with the Holocaust.

The bill calls for the membership of the Commission to include the Commissioner of Education, the Chancellor of Higher Education and 19 public members. Three appointments each are made by the Senate President and the Assembly Speaker. The remaining 13 members are appointed by the Governor. They will serve for staggered three year terms following the initial appointment of no less than 6 members of the current advisory Council on Holocaust Education.

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
