BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. Section 3 of P.L.1977, c.225 (C.34:1A-47) is amended to read as follows:
- 3. As used in this act, unless a different meaning appears from the context:
- a. "Council" means the <sup>1</sup>[Governor's] New Jersey Tourism Advisory Council.
- b. "Director" means the Director of the Division of Travel andTourism.
  - c. "Division" means the Division of Travel and Tourism.
  - d. "Tourism" means activities involved in providing and marketing services and products, including accommodations, for nonresidents and residents who travel to and in New Jersey for recreation and pleasure.
  - e. "Tourist industry" means the industry consisting of private and public organizations which directly or indirectly provide services and products to nonresidents and residents who travel to and in New Jersey for recreation and pleasure.
  - (cf: P.L.1977, c.225, s.3)
- 2. Section 7 of P.L.1977, c.225 (C.34:1A-51) is amended to read as follows:
  - 7. a. There is [hereby] created in the division the  ${}^{1}$ [Governor's] New Jersey  ${}^{1}$  Tourism Advisory Council [consisting of 12] which shall consist of  ${}^{1}$ [15] 17 members  ${}^{1}$ [to be appointed as follows] [by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate:
    - (1) Three representatives of the tourist industry;
  - (2) Three representatives from among the elected officials in those municipalities that expend funds for the advertising of their recreational, travel, and tourism attractions;
  - (3) Three representatives from among the county boards of freeholders of the State; and
  - (4) Three representatives of the public, one of whom the Governor shall designate as chairman for the term of his

- (1) [One member] Two members of the Senate, to be appointed by the President thereof, not more than one of whom shall be of the same political party, and lone member] two members of the General Assembly, to be appointed by the Speaker thereof of the more than one of whom shall be of the same political party; [Ignd] of the same political party]; [Ignd]

#### **STATEMENT**

This bill restructures the Tourism Advisory Council established pursuant to the "Division of Travel and Tourism Act," P.L.1977, c.225 (C.34:1A-45 et seq.) and changes the name of the council to the Governor's Tourism Advisory Council.

As originally established, the council's purpose was to help the Division of Travel and Tourism develop a 10 year tourism master plan for the State. However, of the 12 members of the committee, only 3 were representatives of the tourism industry. This bill would increase the membership of the council from 12 to 15 and provide that members be chosen from lodging, food service, transportation, convention and visitor bureaus, tour services, outdoor recreation, historical and cultural arts, entertainment/amusement, the financial community and marketing sectors of the tourism industry. The Director of Travel and Tourism would remain a nonvoting member of the newly organized council.

The tourism industry and State tourism programs have changed dramatically over the past several years. To remain competitive with other states that employ increasingly sophisticated methods to attract tourists, New Jersey needs to utilize equally creative ideas. By restructuring the council to include representation from the various sectors of the tourism industry, the council will have the expertise needed to advise the Division of Travel and Tourism on domestic and international tourism initiatives.

The Senate State Government and Federal and Interstate Relations Committee reports favorably and with committee amendments Senate, No. 3376.

This bill increases and revises the membership of the Tourism Advisory Council and renames it the New Jersey Tourism Advisory Council. It increases the membership from 12 to 17 and removes the requirement that the council shall consist of representatives from the tourist industry, certain municipalities, the county boards of freeholders, and the public. It provides instead that the council shall consist of two members of the Senate, not more than one of whom shall be of the same political party, two members of the General Assembly, not more than one of whom shall be of the same political party, 12 public members, not more than seven of whom shall be of the same political party, and the Director of the Division of Travel and Tourism. The public members shall be appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, and shall be chosen from various sectors of the tourist industry, such as lodging, food service, transportation, convention and visitor bureaus, tour outdoor recreation, historical and cultural entertainment or amusement, finance, and marketing. The director shall be a nonvoting member of the council.

The bill also provides that the term of existing council members shall cease and terminate upon the effective date of this act.

#### **COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS**

The committee amended the bill to: increase the council's membership from 15 to 17 by requiring the appointment of four, rather than two, legislators to be appointed on a bipartisan basis; provide that not more than seven of the public members shall be of the same political party; and to rename the council as the New Jersey Tourism Advisory Council rather than the Governor's Tourism Advisory Council.

### **GOVERNOR SIGNS BILL BOOSTING TOURISM COUNCIL**

WILDWOOD -- The state's Tourism Advisory Council will be revamped to include more members and "new voices with new ideas" under legislation signed today by Governor Jim Florio, aimed at giving another boost to the state's \$13 billion tourism industry.

"People come from all over the world come to New Jersey. In all, more than 50 million people visited our state last year and this year promises to be even better," said Governor Florio, at the Wildwood Tourism Center. "Some people come for the ocean and beautiful shoreline. Others come for the rich historical legacy we have in America. And still others come to see nature at its very best. That's why tourism is the third largest industry in our state."

"Today we're taking another important step to make sure that our tourism industry remains strong and prosperous. New Jersey's people are our ambassadors to the world. And in the competitive world of tourism, our people are our best assets," he said. "Their innovative ideas and hard work helped us weather tough times and reclaim our position as a leader in tourism in the region. The new council will contain not just more voices, but new voices with new ideas about how to make New Jersey an even better place to visit and live."

The Tourism Advisory Council works alongside the state Division of Travel and Tourism, making recommendations on developing tourism plans in New Jersey.

The bill, S 3376/A 4853/A 4895, sponsored by Senator Richard Van Wagner and Assemblymen Ray Batten and Fred Scerni, renames the council as the "New Jersey Tourism Advisory Council" and increases the council's membership from 12 to 17. The members will include two from the Senate, two from the Assembly, the Director of the Division of Travel and Tourism and 12 public members.

The public members are to be representatives of various sectors of the travel and tourism industry including: food service, lodging, transportation, the regional

tourism council, convention bureau, tour services, outdoor recreation, historical and cultural arts, entertainment, the financial community and marketing research.

The restructure of the council will allow it to be more effective to the Division of Travel and Tourism, and enable New Jersey's methods of attracting tourists to remain competitive with other states. By including public members from various sectors of the tourism industry, the council will have the diverse and in-depth expertise needed to advise the Division on tourism initiatives.

Earlier this month, Governor Florio visited the Point Pleasant Beach to wrap up a banner summer season at the shore. According to the state Department of Commerce, approximately 7 million people visited the Jersey shore this summer, spending \$8 billion.

"1991 marked one of the best seasons for the shore in years. It was a season of clean water and clean beaches. We can celebrate because we took some important steps over the last couple of years. We put an end to ocean dumping. We got more money to control storm-sewer overflows. We've provided millions of dollars in bond money for new sewage treatment plants," Governor Florio said. "We passed the Clean Water Enforcement Act which is the toughest in the nation. And we're going after polluters. We're taking these steps because we take seriously our responsibility to protect our environment and preserve it for our children and their children. But the ocean is only one of the treasures that makes New Jersey such a great place to visit."
