BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. As used in this act, "Initial Active Duty Training" means Basic Military Training, for members of the New Jersey Air National Guard, and Basic Combat Training and Advanced Individual Training, for members of the New Jersey Army National Guard.
- 2. Any member of the New Jersey National Guard shall be permitted to attend regularly-scheduled courses at any public institution of higher education in this State enumerated in N.J.S.18A:62-1 and receive up to 12 credits per semester tuition-free provided that:
- a. the member has completed Initial Active Duty Training and is in good standing as an active member of the New Jersey National Guard;
- b. the member has been accepted to pursue a course of undergraduate study and is enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at that institution; ¹[and]
- c. the member has applied for all available State student grants and scholarships and all available federal student grants and scholarships for which the member is eligible; and 1
- 1 [c.] <u>d.</u>¹ available classroom space permits and tuition-paying students constitute the minimum number required for the course.
- 3. Any child or surviving spouse of a member of the New Jersey National Guard who heretofore completed Initial Active Duty Training and was killed in the performance of his duties while on active duty with the New Jersey National Guard, or who hereafter completes Initial Active Duty Training and is killed in the performance of his duties while a member of the New Jersey National Guard, shall be permitted to attend regularly-scheduled

AN ACT concerning tuition free enrollment in public institutions of higher education for members of the New Jersey National Guard and certain surviving spouses and children of New Jersey National Guard members and supplementing chapter 71 of Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. Any member of the New Jersey National Guard who is accepted to pursue a course of undergraduate study in any public institution of higher education in this State enumerated in N.J.S.18A:62-1 shall be permitted to attend regularly scheduled courses and receive up to 12 credits per semester tuition free provided that:
- a. the individual is in good standing as an active member of the New Jersey National Guard;
- b. the individual is enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at the institution; and,
- c. available classroom space permits and tuition paying students constitute the minimum number required for the course.
- 2. Any child or surviving spouse of a member of the New Jersey National Guard who was killed in the performance of his duties while on active duty with the New Jersey National Guard who is accepted to pursue a course of undergraduate study in any public institution of higher education in this State enumerated in N.J.S. 18A:62-1 shall be permitted to attend regularly scheduled courses and receive up to 12 credits per semester tuition free provided that:
- a. the individual is enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at the institution; and,
- b. available classroom space permits and tuition paying students constitute the minimum number required for the course.
- 3. Nothing in this act shall preclude a public institution of higher education from requiring the payment of other fees, subject to approval by the State Board of Higher Education, for individuals attending courses pursuant to the provisions of this act.
- 4. The State Board of Higher Education shall adopt pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), rules and regulations necessary to implement the provisions of this act.

5. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

This bill provides that any member of the New Jersey National Guard who is accepted to pursue a course of undergraduate study in a public institution of higher education in this State may receive up to 12 credits per semester tuition free provided that the individual is in good standing as an active member of the National Guard, is enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at the institution, and that available classroom space permits and tuition paying students constitute the minimum number required for the course.



AN ACT concerning tuition assistance for members of the New Jersey National Guard and certain surviving spouses and children of New Jersey National Guard members and supplementing chapter 71 of Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

1. Any member of the New Jersey National Guard who is accepted to pursue a course of undergraduate study in any public institution of higher education of this State enumerated in N.J.S.18A:62-1 shall, while enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at the institution and while continuing to be a member of the New Jersey National Guard, have a portion of the tuition paid by the State as follows:

Credit hours per semester	Portion of tuition
or equivalent thereof:	paid by the State:
12 or more	75%
9 - 11	60%
6 - 8	50%
3 - 5	40%

- 2. Any child or surviving spouse of a member of the New Jersey National Guard who was killed in the performance of his duties while on active duty with the New Jersey National Guard who is accepted to pursue a course of undergraduate study in any public institution of higher education in this State, as enumerated in N.J.S.18A:62-1., shall, while enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at such college, have their full tuition paid by the State.
- 3. The Board of Higher Education shall promulgate, pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), such rules and regulations as may be necessary to effectuate the purposes of this act.
 - 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

The bill provides that the State will pay a portion of the tuition for a member of the New Jersey National Guard who is enrolled as an undergraduate student at a public institution of higher education in the State. The extent of the State payment would vary according to the number of credits for which an eligible member was enrolled. The payments range from 75% for a member enrolled for 12 or more credit hours to 40% for a member enrolled for three credit hours.

In addition the bill provides that a child or surviving spouse of a New Jersey National Guard killed while on active duty would receive full State payment of undergraduate tuition at a public college or university in the State.

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VETERANS

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Provides State tuition payments for certain members of New Jersey National Guard and for certain children and surviving spouses of deceased members.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. Each public institution of higher education in New Jersey shall, pursuant to such rules and regulations as shall be promulgated by the State Board of Higher Education, permit active members of the New Jersey National Guard to attend without the payment of any tuition charges in regularly scheduled courses and receive up to a maximum of nine credits per semester for those courses; provided that available classroom space permits and that tuition paying students constitute the minimum number required for the course. Nothing herein shall preclude institutions from requiring the payment of other fees, subject to approval by the State Board, for individuals attending courses pursuant to this act.
 - 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

This bill allows active members of the New Jersey National Guard to attend regularly scheduled courses at any public institution of higher education, and to receive up to a maximum of nine credits per semester for those courses, without the payment of tuition, provided there is sufficient space available and paying students constitute the minimum number required for those courses. Members of the National Guard would be subject to the usual registration and student fees charged during a semester.

HIGHER EDUCATION

Allows members of the New Jersey National Guard to attend institutions of higher education tuition free.

ASSEMBLY VETERANS AND MILITARY AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

The Assembly Veterans and Military Affairs Committee reports favorably an Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly, No. 3222, Assembly, No. 1202, and Assembly, No. 2000.

This committee substitute provides that any member of the New Jersey National Guard who is accepted to pursue a course of undergraduate study in a public institution of higher education in this State may receive up to 12 credits per semester tuition-free provided that the individual has completed Initial Active Duty Training, is in good standing as an active member of the National Guard and is enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at the institution, and that available classroom space permits and tuition-paying students constitute the minimum number required for the course. The bill defines Initial Active Duty Training, or IADT, as Basic Military Training, for members of the New Jersey Air National Guard, and Basic Combat Training and Advanced Individual Training, for members of the New Jersey Army National Guard.

The bill also provides that any child or surviving spouse of a member of the New Jersey National Guard who heretofore completed Initial Active Duty Training and was killed in the performance of his duties while on active duty with the New Jersey National Guard, or who hereafter completes IADT and is killed in the performance of his duties, and is accepted to pursue a course of undergraduate study in any public college or university in the State may attend regularly scheduled courses and receive up to 12 credits per semester tuition–free, provided that the individual is enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at the institution and that available classroom space permits and tuition–paying students constitute the minimum number required for the course.

As used in the bill, the phrase "any public college or university in the State" includes the six State colleges, the county colleges, the public junior colleges, the New Jersey College of Medicine and Dentistry, the College of Aeronautical and Airspace Science, the industrial schools, Newark College of Engineering, Rutgers University and any other public universities, colleges, county colleges and junior colleges subsequently established by law.

FISCAL IMPACT

It is the belief of the sponsors that this committee substitute will have no fiscal impact on current State expenditures and revenues.

SENATE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The Senate Education favorably reports this substitute without committee amendments.

This committee substitute provides that any member of the New Jersey National Guard may attend regularly-scheduled courses at any public institution of higher education in this State and receive up to 12 credits per semester tuition-free if: (1) the member has completed Initial Active Duty Training and is in good standing as an active member of the National Guard; (2) the member has been accepted to pursue a course of study and is enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at the institution; and (3) available classroom space permits and tuition-paying students constitute the minimum number required for the course. The bill defines Initial Active Duty Training (IADT) as Basic Military Training, for members of the New Jersey Air National Guard, and Basic Combat Training and Advanced Individual Training, for members of the New Jersey Army National Guard.

The bill also provides that any child or surviving spouse of a member of the New Jersey National Guard who heretofore completed Initial Active Duty Training and was killed in the performance of his duties while on active duty with the New Jersey National Guard, or who hereafter completes IADT and is killed in the performance of his duties, may attend regularly-scheduled courses at any public institution of higher education in this State and receive up to 12 credits per semester tuition–free if: (1) the child or spouse has been accepted to pursue a course of study and is enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at the institution and (2) available classroom space permits and tuition–paying students constitute the minimum number required for the course.

As used in the bill, the phrase "any public college or university in the State" includes the nine State colleges, the county colleges, and the senior public institutions of higher education such as Rutgers, the State University, the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey and the New Jersey Institute of Technology.

ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR ASSEMBLY BILL NOS. 3222, 1202 and 2000

To the General Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14, of the New Jersey Constitution, I am returning Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 3222 with my objections for reconsideration.

Under the committee substitute, any member of the New Jersey National Guard who is accepted to pursue an undergraduate course of study in any public institution in the State, while enrolled and in good standing as an undergraduate at the institution and who continues to be a member of the New Jersey National Guard in good standing, shall receive up to 12 credits per semester, tuition-free.

In addition, any surviving spouse or child of a member of the New Jersey National Guard who is killed in the performance of his/her duties while on active duty with the New Jersey National Guard shall receive up to 12 credits per semester tuition-free, provided the surviving spouse or child has been accepted to pursue an undergraduate course of study at a public institution or is enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at the institution.

It is important to encourage young men and women to enlist in the National Guard and continue in the Guard. This legislation provides an important incentive, and I believe, provides proper encouragement for enlistment in the National Guard and education while in the Guard.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

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To take advantage of available financial assistance, I am recommending that Guardsmen first apply for all available federal or state grants or scholarships for which they may be eligible. This will allow Guardsmen, or eligible surviving spouse or child, to first determine if they are eligible for State, federal funds, or merit scholarships before gaining tuition free enrollment.

Therefore, I herewith return Assembly Bill Nos. 3222, 1202, 2000 ACS and recommend that it be amended as follows:

GOVERNOR SIGNS LAW PROVIDING TUITION ASSISTANCE TO NATIONAL GUARD MEMBERS AND FAMILIES

LAWRENCEVILLE -- National Guard members or their surviving spouses and children will be eligible to attend state public institutions tuition-free under legislation signed today by Governor Jim Florio.

"When a man or woman steps up to serve their country and their state, they stir our pride. The men and women who serve in the New Jersey National Guard know all about pride. It's part of why they serve," said Governor Florio, during a bill signing ceremony at the National Guard Armory. "Today's bill signing ceremony is a reflection of that pride we have and this bill is a way of saying thanks. I'm very pleased to sign it because it reflects my belief that education is just another word for opportunity."

Governor Florio also announced a new commemorative Desert Storm license plate which 89 sanctioned veterans organizations will sell to raise funds for various programs honoring and aiding veterans and their families.

The bill, A 3222/S 2528, was sponsored by Assemblypersons Dolores Cooper, Fred Scerni, Michael Arnone and John Kelly, and Senator Thomas Foy and Thomas Paterniti. The original bill was conditionally vetoed by the Governor on June 24. The legislation was amended to reflect the Governor's recommendations requiring eligible guard members and their families to first apply for all other federal/state grant or scholarships before gaining tuition-free enrollment.

Under the new law, any New Jersey National Guard member who is accepted to any state public institution and is pursuing an undergraduate course of study can receive up to 12 tuition-free credits per semester while enrolled and in good standing. The law requires that the guard member complete Initial Active Duty Training before any of the tuition-free benefits apply.

In addition, any child or surviving spouse of a guard member killed in the performance of his/her duties is also eligible to receive up to 12 tuition-free credits per semester while enrolled as an undergraduate student in good standing at a public institution.

"It used to be that the National Guard was one of the best-kept secrets in New Jersey. Not any more. After Desert Shield and Desert Storm, the whole world got to know our National Guard," said Governor Florio, who is a former Navy serviceman and retired Navy Reservist. "This bill is a good step forward for New Jersey and it's part of our continuing commitment to those who sacrifice so much for all of us."
