BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. No person shall sell or offer to sell at retail any bicycle unless there is affixed to that bicycle a statement promoting the use of helmets by bicycle riders. 

  1 If a bicycle is sold unassembled, the statement shall be displayed in a prominent manner on the carton or package containing the unassembled bicycle.

The Director of the Division of Consumer Affairs in the Department of Law and Public Safety shall, pursuant to the provisions of the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.), promulgate rules and regulations to effectuate the purposes of this act. In addition to such other matters as the director shall deem appropriate and necessary, those rules and regulations so promulgated shall provide that the affixing of the warning cards "This Bike Is Missing One Part," designed by the New Jersey Coalition for Prevention of Developmental Disabilities and funded by the Office for the Prevention of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities in the Department of Human Services, to a bicycle offered for sale at retail shall fulfill the requirements of section 1 of this act and that those warning cards shall be readily available to the retail sellers of bicycles at cost.
- 3. This act shall take effect on the first day of the third month following enactment.

#### **CONSUMER AFFAIRS**

Requires notices promoting use of helmets be attached to bicycles sold at retail.

Each year nearly 50,000 children suffer serious head injuries as the result of bicycling accidents. Many of those injuries could be avoid if bicycle riders would wear protective helmets.

The bill provides that retailers may fulfill the notice requirement by affixing the warning card: "This Bike Is Missing One Part," which is designed by the New Jersey Coalition for the Prevention of Developmental Disabilities and which is funded through the Office for the Prevention of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities. The message in that warning card simply urges bicycle riders to wear a helmet because it "prevents head injury and may save your life."

According to the Coalition for the Prevention of Developmental Disabilities, head injuries are one of the most preventable causes of developmental disabilities.

The Assembly Consumer Affairs Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 3305.

Assembly Bill No. 3305 requires retail sellers to affix a safety statement promoting the used of helmets on every bicycle offered for sale.

The bill provides that retailers may fulfill the notice requirement by affixing the warning card: "This Bike Is Missing One Part," which is designed by the New Jersey Coalition for the Prevention of Developmental Disabilities and which is funded through the Office for the Prevention of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities. The message in that warning card simply urges bicycle riders to wear a helmet because it "prevents head injury and may save your life."

According to the sponsor's statement, nearly 50,000 children suffer serious head injuries as a result of bicycling accidents each year. Many of those injuries could be avoided if bicycle riders would wear protective helmets.

The Senate Law, Public Safety and Defense Committee favorably reports Assembly Bill No. 3305 with amendments.

As amended, this bill requires retailers to affix a notice on every bicycle offered for sale promoting the used of helmets. The committee amended the bill to permit the notice to be affixed to the package or carton containing the bicycle if the bicycle is sold unassembled.

The notice requirement may be met by affixing a card which states: "This Bike Is Missing One Part." The card is designed by the New Jersey Coalition for the Prevention of Developmental Disabilities and made available through the Office for the Prevention of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities. The message on that card simply urges bicycle riders to wear a helmet because it "prevents head injuries and may save a life."
