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STATEMENT

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This bill would amend current law to allow persons who adopt dogs or cats through a non-profit animal adoption referral service to participate in the Animal Population Control Program's low cost spaying and neutering program. Currently, only those who adopt pets from referral services that operate licensed holding facilities may participate in the program. This bill, by promoting the spaying and neutering of more animals, would help to reduce the huge number of unwanted pets who, unfortunately, must be destroyed every year.

The Assembly Economic Growth, Agriculture, Tourism and Coastal Protection Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 2835.

This bill would amend P.L.1983, c.172 (C.4:19A-1 et seq.), which law provided for establishment and implementation of a State Animal Population Control Program, the purposes of which was to reduce the population of unwanted stray or feral cats and dogs by encouraging the owners to have those animals permanently sexually sterilized. By spaying and neutering the expanding population of unwanted domestic animals, the program would reduce the threats to the public health and safety, and reduce the large number of stray and feral dogs and cats which are euthanized each year.

This bill would amend section 3 of P.L.1983 (C.14:19A-2), which deals with the eligibility of pet owners for the low-cost sterilization services provided by the program. In addition to the criteria contained in the existing law, this bill would provide that persons who adopt dogs or cats from a non-profit animal adoption referral service which does not operate a holding facility, may avail themselves of the program's sterilization services. Under the current law, if the referral service does not operate a holding facility, the pet adopted therefrom would not qualify for low cost spaying or neutering.

The Senate Natural Resources and Agriculture Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 2835.

This bill would amend current law to allow persons who adopt dogs or cats through a non-profit animal adoption referral service which does not operate operate a holding facility to participate in the Animal Population Control Program's low cost spaying and neutering program. Currently, if the referral service does not operate a holding facility, the pet adopted therefrom does not qualify for low cost spaying or neutering. This bill, by promoting the spaying and neutering of more animals, would help to reduce the huge number of unwanted pets that must be destroyed every year.
