Sponsored by Assemblymen DEVERIN, McENROE and McGREEVEY

AN ACT concerning the provision of nursing services to nonpublic schools, supplementing chapter 40 of Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes and making an appropriation.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. The Legislature hereby finds and determines that the welfare of the State requires that all school-age children be assured equal access to appropriate health care services. In order to achieve this objective, it is the intent of the Legislature to require that the State and local communities provide basic nursing services for children in both public and nonpublic schools.
 - 2. As used in this act:
 - "Commissioner" means the State Commissioner of Education.

"Nonpublic school" means an elementary or secondary school within the State, other than a public school, offering education for grades kindergarten through 12, or any combination of them, wherein any child may legally fulfill compulsory school attendance requirements and which complies with the requirements of Title VI of the "Civil Rights Act of 1964," Pub.L.88-352, (42 U.S.C.\secondonumber 2000d et seq.)

"Support limit" means the maximum amount which may be appropriated each year for the purposes of this act for each pupil enrolled full-time in nonpublic schools of the State.

- 3. Each board of education of a district in which a nonpublic school is located shall:
- a. provide nursing services for pupils who are enrolled full-time in the nonpublic school. The services shall include:
- (1) assistance with medical examinations, including dental screening;
 - (2) conducting screening of hearing examinations;
- (3) the maintenance of student health records, and notification of local or county health officials of any student who has not been properly immunized; and
- (4) conducting examinations of pupils between the ages of 10 and 18 for the condition known as scoliosis.
- b. adopt written policies and procedures extending the emergency care provided to public school pupils to those pupils who are enrolled full-time in the nonpublic school who are injured or become ill at school or during participation on a school team or squad.

4. Each board of education of a district in which a nonpublic school is located may:

 a. within the limit of funds appropriated or otherwise made available, adopt policies and procedures to provide the pupils who are enrolled full-time in the nonpublic school with additional medical services; and

b. provide the necessary equipment, materials and services for immunizing the pupils who are enrolled full-time in the nonpublic school from the diseases which pupils are required to be immunized against by the State Sanitary Code adopted pursuant to section 7 of P.L.1947, c.177 (C.26:1A-7) or for diseases against which immunization may be recommended by the State Department of Health.

- 5. The nursing services provided to nonpublic schools under sections 3 and 4 of this act shall not include instructional services.
- 6. A board of education may join with other boards of education or contract with any public or private agency approved by the commissioner for the provision of nursing services required or permitted under sections 3 and 4 of this act.
- 7. A nonpublic school may decline the nursing services which are required or permitted under sections 3 and 4 of this act by submitting written notification to the board of education from the appropriate administrator of the nonpublic school.
- 8. A pupil who is enrolled in a nonpublic school and whose parent or guardian objects to the pupil receiving any services provided under this act shall not be compelled to receive the services except for a physical or medical examination to determine whether the pupil is ill or infected with a communicable disease.
- 9. a. The support limit for the 1991-92 school year shall be \$60. For each school year thereafter the commissioner shall determine the support limit by multiplying the support limit for the previous school year times the sum of 1.0 plus the average annual percentage increase in State per capita personal income as determined pursuant to section 3 of P.L.1990, c.52 (C.18A:7D-3).
- b. On or before November 5 of each year, each board of education shall forward to the commissioner an estimate of the cost of providing, during the next school year, the services required pursuant to this act and the number of pupils attending nonpublic schools located within the district as of the last school day of October of the current school year, excluding those pupils who have refused nursing services pursuant to section 7 of this act. The commissioner shall provide State aid to each school district in an amount equal to the number of nonpublic school pupils within the district identified by the district on or before November 5 multiplied by the State support limit. In the event that the expenditure incurred by any district is less than the amount of State aid received, the district shall refund the unexpended State aid after the completion of the school year, but

not later than December 1 of the following school year.

- c. If in any year the amount of State aid appropriated is insufficient to carry out in full the provisions of this act, the commissioner shall apportion that appropriation among the districts in proportion to the State aid each district would have received had the full amount of State aid been appropriated. In any year, no district shall be required to make expenditures for the purposes of this act in excess of the amount of State aid received for these purposes.
- d. Any State aid provided to a school district pursuant to this section shall not be included in the calculation of the spending limitations established pursuant to section 85 of P.L. 1990, c. 52 (C. 18A:7D-28).
- 10. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Education \$10,000,000 for the purposes of this act.
 - 11. This act shall take effect immediately.

EDUCATION

Requires local school districts to provide certain nursing services to nonpublic school pupils and appropriates \$10 million.

- 3. Each board of education shall provide nursing services for each child attending a nonpublic school within the district, which are substantially equivalent to the services provided in the public schools.
- 4. If the provision of services pursuant to this act requires transportation, the board of education shall provide for the transportation and the costs shall be paid from State aid received by the district pursuant to this act.
- 5. A board of education may contract with any public or private agency approved by the Commissioner of Education for the provision of nursing services.
- 6. On October 1, 1985 and each October 1 thereafter, each board of education shall forward to the commissioner an estimate of the cost of providing nursing services during the next school year to nonpublic school children pursuant to this act.

In preparing the budget for the 1985-86 school year and each year thereafter, each board of education shall include as an expenditure the estimated cost of providing nursing services to nonpublic school children pursuant to this act.

In preparing its budget for the 1985-86 school year and each year thereafter, each board of education shall include as a revenue State aid in an amount equal to the estimated cost of

AN ACT concerning school nursing services for certain nonpublic school students and supplementing chapter 40 of Title 18A of the New Jersey Statutes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. Each board of education of a special needs district, as defined pursuant to section 3 of P.L.1990, c.52 (C.18A:7D-3), shall provide school nursing services for each child attending a nonpublic school within the district which are substantially equivalent to the school nursing services provided in the public schools. The costs of the nursing services shall be paid by the district.
- 2. As used in this act "nonpublic school" means an elementary or secondary school within the State, other than a public school, offering education for grades kindergarten through 12 or any combination thereof, wherein a child may legally fulfill compulsory school attendance requirements and which complies with the requirements of section 601 of the "Civil Rights Act of 1964," Pub.L. 88-352 (42 U.S.C. § 2000d).
- 3. If the provision of services pursuant to this act requires transportation, the board of education shall provide for the transportation and the costs shall be paid by the district.
- 4. A board of education of a special needs district may contract with any public or private agency approved by the Commissioner of Education for provision of the nursing services required under section 1 of this act.
- 5. The State Board of Education shall adopt rules and regulations pursuant to the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et seq.) necessary to effectuate the purposes of this act.
- 6. This act shall take effect on July 1 next following enactment.

STATEMENT

This bill requires the special needs districts to provide school

nursing services that are substantially equivalent to the school nursing services provided in the public schools to nonpublic school students attending a nonpublic school within the district. It is the intent of the sponsor that these services are to be provided on the premises of the nonpublic school unless the services being provided are therapeutic or remedial in nature in which case they should be provided in a religiously neutral location. There are approximately 46,000 nonpublic school students in the 30 special needs districts.

This bill will assure that all school-age children within these districts are provided equal access to appropriate health care services. The costs of providing these services will be paid by the special needs district from aid received under the "Quality Education Act of 1990."

EDUCATION

Requires special needs school districts to provide nursing services to students attending a nonpublic school within the district.

The Assembly Education Committee favorably reports an Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 320.

This substitute requires a board of education of a district in which a nonpublic school is located to provide nursing services for pupils who are enrolled full-time in the nonpublic school.

The nursing services to be provided will include assistance with physical examinations, including dental screening, the conducting of hearing and scoliosis examinations, and the maintenance of health records. In addition, the board of education must adopt written policies and procedures to extend the emergency care provided to public school pupils to nonpublic school pupils who are injured or become ill at school or during participation on a school team or squad. These nursing services are currently being provided to public school pupils in the district.

Under the substitute, a board of education may also adopt policies and procedures to provide pupils enrolled full-time in a nonpublic school with additional medical services, within the limit of funds appropriated or otherwise made available, and to provide the necessary equipment, materials and services for immunization required by the State Sanitary Code or the State Department of Health.

The nursing services which are required or permitted under the substitute are not to include instructional services.

A board may join with other boards of education or contract with any public or private agency approved by the Commissioner of Education for the provision of the nursing services which are required or permitted.

A nonpublic school may decline the services upon written notification to the board of education, and no pupil who is enrolled in a nonpublic school and whose parent or guardian objects to the pupil receiving any of the services provided will be compelled to receive the services.

Finally, the substitute sets a support limit of \$60 per nonpublic school pupil for the 1991-92 school year and provides that the limit will be increased for each school year thereafter by the average annual percentage increase in State per capita personal income. The commissioner will then distribute State aid to each school district in an amount equal to the number of nonpublic school students within the district actually receiving nursing services multiplied by the support limit. An appropriation of \$10 million is made to the Department of Education for this purpose.

Representatives of the New Jersey Catholic Conference, Our Lady of Mt. Virgin School. St. Joseph's School of Camden, Diocese of Metuchen, Our Lady Help of Christians, the New Jersey Department of Education, members of the public and a member of the legislature spoke in favor of the substitute. Representatives of the New Jersey Education Association, New Jersey School Boards Association, and New Jersey School Business Officials testified in opposition to the substitute.

The Assembly Appropriations Committee reports favorably an Assembly Committee Substitute for Assembly Bill Nos. 320 and 4457.

This Assembly committee substitute requires a district board of education in which a nonpublic school is located to provide nursing services for pupils who are enrolled full-time in the nonpublic school and appropriates \$10 million to the Department of Education for State aid for these services.

The nursing services to be provided will include assistance with physical examinations, including dental screening, the conducting of hearing and scoliosis examinations, and the maintenance of health records. In addition, the board of education must adopt written policies and procedures to extend the emergency care provided to public school pupils to nonpublic school pupils who are injured or become ill at school or during participation on a school team or squad. These nursing services are currently being provided to public school pupils in the district.

The board of education may also adopt policies and procedures to provide full-time nonpublic school pupils with additional medical services, within the limit of funds appropriated or otherwise made available, and to provide the necessary equipment, materials and services for immunization required by the State Sanitary Code or the State Department of Health. A board may join with other boards of education or contract with any public or private agency approved by the Commissioner of Education for the provision of the required or permitted nursing services.

A nonpublic school may decline the services upon written notification to the board of education, and no pupil who is enrolled in a nonpublic school and whose parent or guardian objects to the pupil receiving any of the services provided will be compelled to receive the services.

This Assembly committee substitute is identical to Senate Bill No. 3526 (1R) as reported by the Senate Education Committee on June 10, 1991.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The substitute sets a support limit of \$60 per nonpublic school pupil for the 1991-92 school year and provides for an increase each school year thereafter by the average annual percentage increase in State per capita personal income. The commissioner will then distribute State aid to each school district in an amount equal to

the previous year's enrollment of nonpublic school students within the district actually receiving nursing services multiplied by the support limit. An appropriation of \$10 million is made from the General Fund to the Department of Education for this purpose. Any excess State aid must be refunded. An insufficient aid appropriation shall be apportioned to districts in the same proportion as would the full amount of aid. However, districts shall not be required to make expenditures in excess of aid received.

FISCAL NOTE TO ASSEMBLY, No. 320

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

DATED: September 12, 1990

Assembly Bill No. 320 of 1990 would require local school districts to provide nursing services to nonpublic schools which are substantially equivalent to the services provided to public schools. If these services require transportation, the local district shall provide for the transportation and State aid shall reimburse the districts for those costs.

The Department of Education (DOE) has estimated that the nursing services for nonpublic school students would cost the State \$15,120,000 in FY 1990-91. The average cost for nursing services in FY 1986-87 was \$62 per student. Using an annual inflation adjustment of eight percent to account for the increase in nursing salaries and medical equipment and supplies, the department estimates nursing costs of \$84 per student for FY 1990-91. There are approximately 180,000 nonpublic school students in New Jersey, resulting in the \$15,120,000 estimate (180,000 x \$84). Nursing service costs are expected to continue to increase at eight percent each year, resulting in expenditures of \$16,329,600 in FY 1991-92 and \$17,636,000 in FY 1992-93.

The Department of Education was unable to determine the transportation costs which these services would require.

The Office of Legislative Services (OLS) concurs with the Department of Education's estimate of nursing service costs. However, OLS notes that transportation costs also could be significant. The State does not currently provide transportation for nursing services to nonpublic schools and, therefore, a precise calculation of the cost is difficult. Yet, the State does provide transportation for nonpublic students who receive auxiliary services and this program's costs may be used to approximate the expense of providing transportation for nursing services. As with auxiliary services, nursing services may not be provided on the grounds of a sectarian, nonpublic school and would have to be provided in trailers. In FY 1989-90 28,200 nonpublic school students received auxiliary services and the State appropriated \$1,805,000 in transportation aid, for an average of \$64 (\$1,805,000 divided by 28,200) per student. Assuming an annual inflation rate of five percent, this per student figure could be \$67 in FY 1990-91. Not all of these 28,200 students received transportation for auxiliary services, but the DOE does not keep a record of the number that do. Therefore, the actual per student cost could be greater than \$67.

Using the \$67 per student figure, transportation for nonpublic school nursing services could cost the State \$67,000 for every 1,000 students in FY 1990-1991. This figure would vary as transportation costs for nursing services may not be the same as those for auxiliary services. The total cost would depend on the number of students in sectarian, nonpublic schools who were in need of nursing services.

This bill requires local school districts to provide equivalent nursing services to non-public schools. New Jersey schools do not currently provide school nursing services for non-public school children; Pennsylvania and New York already require such services.
