BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

- 1. a. The Legislature finds and declares that there is a need to improve the management, efficiency and effectiveness of municipal court operations and quality of justice by providing funds:
- (1) To be utilized by the Administrative Office of the Courts to design, equip, operate and maintain a standardized, Statewide computer system, including integrated traffic ticket control, court financial accounting, case processing, statistical reporting services and other components necessary to automate municipal court operations; and
- (2) To ensure the smooth exchange of automated information among the Judiciary, the Division of Motor Vehicles, and other public agencies.
- b. In order to accomplish these purposes, there is created the "Automated Traffic System Fund." The fund shall be a dedicated fund within the ¹[general fund] General Fund¹ and administered by the Administrative Office of the Courts. ¹The fund shall be the depository of moneys realized from ²[\$1.00 of every assessment of court costs collected pursuant to N.J.S.22A:3-4] the \$1.00 surcharge imposed pursuant to section 6 of P.L.1990, c. (C.) (now pending before the Legislature as Senate Bill No. 2423 of 1990² and any other moneys made available for the purposes of the fund.¹
- c. The Supreme Court may issue Rules of Court to effectuate the purposes of this act.
- ²2. a. Nothing in this act shall be deemed to prevent a municipality which on the operational date of this act maintains an autonomous computer system for integrated traffic ticket control, court financial accounting, case processing and statistical reporting services from continuing to operate that system independent of the Automated Traffic System computer network.

- 1. a. The Legislature finds and declares that there is a need to improve the management, efficiency and effectiveness of municipal court operations and quality of justice by providing funds:

STATEMENT

This bill creates the "Automated Traffic System Fund," which finances a computer system involving high-speed data exchanges among the municipal courts, the Administrative Office of the Courts, the Division of Motor Vehicles, and other governmental agencies.

According to figures compiled by the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC), the municipal courts process over 5 million traffic and parking cases a year. The Automated Traffic System would improve the processing of this caseload by increasing municipal court staff productivity; streamlining case processing; providing more accurate statistical reporting of drug-related and other specified categories of cases; and providing automated, direct exchanges of information between the Division of Motor Vehicles and the municipal courts for drivers' registration checks, conviction records, license revocations and drivers' record abstracts.

The Automated Traffic System has been operating on a pilot basis in five municipal courts, and, according to the AOC, has been shown to increase efficiency and increase revenue collection. For example, the AOC reports that revenue collections increased 63% (from \$505,537 to \$825,277) in the New Brunswick municipal court in the ten-month period following the court's conversion from a manual system to the Automated Traffic System.

The Senate Judiciary Committee reports favorably Senate Bill No. 2424.

The Automated Traffic System (ATS) is a computer system which is intended to link the municipal courts, the Division of Motor Vehicles and law enforcement agencies with a statewide common database for all parking and traffic matters and to establish the first statewide electronic traffic warrant system. To date ATS has been installed in 104 municipal courts processing nearly 36% of the State's parking and traffic summons with installation scheduled for 38 additional courts and another 271 courts awaiting scheduling. According to data provided by the Administrative Office of the Courts, the collection rate on traffic and parking tickets in courts with ATS has substantially improved. This bill would create the "Automated Traffic System Fund" to act as a permanent source for financing the expansion of the ATS. This fund would be administered by the AOC.

The Senate Revenue, Finance and Appropriations Committee favorably reports Senate Bill No. 2424 CC, with amendments.

Senate Bill No. 2424 CC, as amended, creates the "Automated Traffic System Fund" to be administered by the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC). The fund shall be the depository for the \$1.00 collected pursuant to N.J.S. 22A:3-4, as amended by Senate Bill No. 2423 1R, and any other moneys made available therefor. The moneys in the fund are to be utilized by the AOC to automate municipal court operation and provide for the efficient exchange of information among public agencies.

The Automated Traffic System (ATS) is a computer system which is intended to link the municipal courts, the Division of Motor Vehicles and law enforcement agencies with a Statewide common database for all parking and traffic matters and to establish the first Statewide electronic traffic warrant system. To date ATS has been installed in 104 municipal courts processing nearly 36% of the State's parking and traffic summons with installation scheduled for 38 additional courts and another 271 courts awaiting scheduling. According to data provided by the AOC, the collection rate on traffic and parking tickets in courts with ATS has substantially improved.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

The Committee amendments clarify that the ATS Fund shall be the depository of the \$1.00 collected pursuant to N.J.S. 22A:3-4 (as amended by Senate Bill No. 2423 1R) and any other moneys made available therefor.

FISCAL IMPACT

This bill contains no appropriation. The bill establishes the Automated Traffic System Fund to be administered by the AOC in order to automate municipal court operations and the exchange of information among public agencies. A source of moneys for the fund is the \$1.00 required to be collected for violations of traffic ordinances pursuant to the provisions of Senate Bill No. 2423 1R.

ADVISORY

Governor Jim Florio today allowed three bills to become law. The bills will provide funds to local governments for wastewater treatment and improve the efficiency of the municipal court system.

The bills which became law are:

*S-2682, which authorizes funds for wastewater treatment to the following communities:

 $\star S-2423$, which authorizes municipal court judges to assess an additional \$10 in court costs for motor vehicle violations to fund the Automated Traffic System (ATS), which links motor vehicle agencies around the State.

 $\star S-2424$, which creates the Automated Traffic System Fund as the repository for monies dedicated to finance the Statewide implementation of a computerized data system on motor vehicle offenses.

All three of the bills contain provisions which tie their effectiveness to the signing of other bills, a practice which Florio has previously criticized. On September 10, Florio conditionally vetoed A-3697/S-2683 which appropriated funds for the Wastewater Treatment Trust.

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
