1 AN ACT concerning mass layoffs due to the coronavirus disease 2019
2 pandemic and amending P.L.2007, c.212.

4 **BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State
5 of New Jersey:

7 1. Section 1 of P.L.2007, c.212 (C.34:21-1) is amended to read
8 as follows:

9 1. As used in P.L.2007, c.212 (C.34:21-1 et seq.):

10 "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Labor and
11 Workforce Development.

12 "Department" means the Department of Labor and Workforce
13 Development.

14 "Employer" means an individual or private business entity which
15 employs the workforce at an establishment.

16 "Establishment" means a place of employment which has been
17 operated by an employer for a period longer than three years, but
18 shall not include a temporary construction site. "Establishment" may
19 be a single location or a group of locations, including any facilities
20 located in this State.

21 "Facility" means a building.

22 "Mass layoff" means a reduction in force which is not the result
23 of a transfer or termination of operations and which results in the
24 termination of employment at an establishment during any 30-day
25 period for 50 or more of the employees at or reporting to the
26 establishment, except that "mass layoff" shall not include a mass
27 layoff made necessary because of a fire, flood, natural disaster,
28 national emergency, act of war, civil disorder or industrial sabotage,
29 decertification from participation in the Medicare and Medicaid
30 programs as provided under Titles XVIII and XIX of the federal
31 "Social Security Act," Pub.L. 74-271 (42 U.S.C. s.1395 et seq.) or
32 license revocation pursuant to P.L.1971, c.136 (C.26:2H-1 et al.).

33 "Operating unit" means an organizationally distinct product,
34 operation, or specific work function within or across facilities at a
35 single establishment.

36 "Response team" means the plant closing response team
37 established pursuant to section 5 of P.L.2007, c.212 (C.34:21-5).

38 "Termination of employment" means the layoff of an employee
39 without a commitment to reinstate the employee to his previous
40 employment within six months of the layoff, except that "termination
41 of employment" shall not mean a voluntary departure or retirement

EXPLANATION – Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law.

Matter underlined thus is new matter.

1 or a discharge or suspension for misconduct of the employee
2 connected with the employment or any layoff of a seasonal employee
3 or refer to any situation in which an employer offers to an employee,
4 at a location inside the State and not more than 50 miles from the
5 previous place of employment, the same employment or a position
6 with equivalent status, benefits, pay and other terms and conditions
7 of employment, and, except that a layoff of more than six months
8 which, at its outset, was announced to be a layoff of six months or
9 less, shall not be treated as a termination of employment under
10 P.L.2007, c.212 (C.34:21-1 et seq.) if the extension beyond six
11 months is caused by business circumstances not reasonably
12 foreseeable at the time of the initial layoff, and notice is given at the
13 time it becomes reasonably foreseeable that the extension beyond six
14 months will be required.

15 "Termination of operations" means the permanent or temporary
16 shutdown of a single establishment, or of one or more facilities or
17 operating units within a single establishment, except that
18 "termination of operations" shall not include a termination of
19 operations made necessary because of a fire, flood, natural disaster,
20 national emergency, act of war, civil disorder or industrial sabotage,
21 decertification from participation in the Medicare and Medicaid
22 programs as provided under Titles XVIII and XIX of the federal
23 "Social Security Act," Pub.L. 74-271 (42 U.S.C. s.1395 et seq.) or
24 license revocation pursuant to P.L.1971, c.136 (C.26:2H-1 et al.).

25 "Transfer of operations" means the permanent or temporary
26 transfer of a single establishment, or one or more facilities or
27 operating units within a single establishment, to another location,
28 inside or outside of this State.

31 2. Section 3 of P.L.2019, c.423 is amended to read as follows:

32 3. **【This act】** P.L.2019, c.423 shall take effect on the **【180th】**
33 **90th** day next following the **【date of enactment】** termination of
34 Executive Order 103 of 2020.

37 3. This act shall take effect immediately, and shall be retroactive
38 to March 9, 2020.

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STATEMENT

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43 This bill provides revises the "Millville Dallas Airmotive Plant
44 Job Loss Notification Act" to provide that the definition of mass
45 layoff does not include a mass layoff that is necessary because of a
46 fire, flood, natural disaster, national emergency, act of war, civil
47 disorder or industrial sabotage, decertification from participation in
48 the Medicare and Medicaid programs as provided under Titles XVIII

1 and XIX of the federal "Social Security Act," Pub.L. 74-271 (42
2 U.S.C. s.1395 et seq.) or license revocation pursuant to P.L.1971,
3 c.136 (C.26:2H-1 et al.). In addition, the bill makes the change to the
4 definition of mass layoff retroactive to March 9, 2020.

5 The bill also amends the effective date of P.L.2019, c.423, which
6 revised the "Millville Dallas Airmotive Plant Job Loss Notification
7 Act" by changing severance requirements for employers in the case
8 of mass layoffs, or termination or transfers of operations. The
9 effective date in P.L.2019, c.423 is the 180th day next following the
10 date of enactment of the bill, which would be July 19, 2020 based on
11 the bill's date of enactment. This bill changes the effective date to
12 the 90th day next following the termination of Governor Murphy's
13 Executive Order 103.

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Governor Murphy Takes Action on Legislation

TRENTON – Today, Governor Murphy signed the following bills into law:

A-2371/S-865 (Kennedy, Pinkin, Zwicker/Smith, Bateman) - Requires large food waste generators to separate and recycle food waste and amends definition of "Class I renewable energy"

A-3901/S-2334 (Chiaravalloti, Kennedy, Speight, Dunn/Pou, Vitale, Greenstein, Brown) - Permits professional and occupational licensing boards to reactivate licensure of certain individuals during state of emergency or public health emergency

A-3903/S-2336 (Downey, Houghtaling, Swain/Greenstein, Gopal, Singleton, O'Scanlon) - Allows remote notarial acts during Public Health Emergency and State of Emergency declared by Governor in Executive Order 103 of 2020

A-3904/S-2337 (Burzichelli, Schepisi, Lampitt, Jasey, Stanfield/Cardinale, Beach, Kean) - Permits use of virtual or remote instruction to meet minimum 180-day school year requirement under certain circumstances

S-2333/A-3910 (Kean, Sweeney, Smith, O'Scanlon/Kennedy, Burzichelli, DiMaio, Greenwald) - Provides civil and criminal immunity to certain health care professionals and health care facilities during public health emergency and state of emergency; facilitates issuance of certain temporary licenses and certifications during public health emergency and state of emergency

S-2338/A-3918 (Sarlo, Oroho, Bucco/Pintor Marin, Wirths, Burzichelli) - "COVID-19 Fiscal Mitigation Act"; clarifies filing and payment deadline for CBT and GIT taxpayers, modifies duration of State Fiscal Years 2020 and 2021, requires certain updates and presentation for State Fiscal Years 2020 and 2021

S-2342/A-3915 (Bucco, Greenstein/Dunn, Bergen) - Permits nonprofit corporations to allow members to participate in meetings by means of remote communication, and permits nonprofit corporations to hold meetings in part or solely by means of remote communication during state of emergency

S-2349/A-3922 (Beach/Coughlin, Jimenez, Swain) - Changes date of 2020 primary election from June 2 to July 7

S-2353/A-3938 (Cryan/Quijano) - Excludes from severance requirements under "Millville Dallas Airmotive Plant Job Loss Notification Act" mass layoffs resulting from coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic
