INTRODUCED FEBRUARY 4, 1975

AN ACT to supplement Title 9 by extending the Interstate Compact
as to Juveniles.

1 BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State*
2 *of New Jersey:*

1 1. The Governor is authorized and directed to execute, with
2 any other state or states legally joining in the same, an amendment
3 to the Interstate Compact on Juveniles, which shall provide the
4 remedies set forth in section 2 of this act in addition to those pro-
5 vided by P. L. 1955, c. 55 or any other law, and shall be binding
6 among and between those party states which execute the same.

1 2. All provisions and procedures of Article V and VI of the
2 Interstate Compact on Juveniles shall be construed to apply to any
3 juvenile charged with being a delinquent by reason of a violation
4 of any criminal law. Any juvenile, charged with being a delinquent
5 by reason of violating any criminal law shall be returned to the
6 requesting state upon a requisition to the state where the juvenile
7 may be found, provided that the underlying offense is designated
8 a crime in this State. A petition in such case shall be filed in a
9 court of competent jurisdiction in the requesting state where the
10 violation of criminal law is alleged to have been committed. The
11 petition may be filed regardless of whether the juvenile has left
12 the state before or after the filing of the petition. The requisition
13 described in Article V of the compact shall be forwarded by the
14 judge of the court in which the petition has been filed.

1 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

STATEMENT

The existing Interstate Compact as to Juveniles, P. L. 1955, c. 55, makes no provision for the prompt return to New Jersey of a nonresident juvenile who is charged with a crime such as murder in New Jersey and then flees to another jurisdiction. The Uniform Criminal Extradition Act, N. J. S. 2A:160-6 et seq., is unavailable for fugitive juveniles who are too young to be indicted as adults.
